1. Working as a Pharmacist [NOC 2021: 31120/ NOC 2016: 3131]

Job Description

Community and hospital pharmacists compound and dispense prescribed pharmaceuticals and provide consultative services to clients and health care providers.

As a **Pharmacist** you perform some or all of the following duties:

- Check prescriptions for proper dosage
- Compound prescribed pharmaceutical products by calculating, measuring and mixing the quantities of drugs and other ingredients required and filling appropriate containers with correct quantity
- Dispense prescribed pharmaceuticals to customers or to other health care professionals and advise them on indications, contra-indications, adverse effects, drug interactions and dosage
- Maintain medication profiles of customers including registry of poisons and narcotic and controlled drugs

As an *Industrial Pharmacist* you perform some or all of the following duties:

- Participate in research for the development of new drugs
- Coordinate different types of clinical and non-clinical tests during the development of new drugs

Industry Overview

There is a shortage of pharmacists in British Columbia and a significant number of job openings are expected in response to new job creation and the need to replace retiring workers. Rural and smaller communities, in particular, are short of both community and hospital pharmacists.

Over the last decade years, Canada's aging population has led to a rapidly increasing number of prescriptions being filled by pharmacists. The largest increase in pharmacy activity has taken place in community pharmacies that are located in food and general merchandise stores. Many jobs will be created in retail pharmacies as more supermarkets and general merchandisers open pharmacies in their stores.

Salary

In BC, the median annual salary for pharmacists is \$98,725. Pharmacists who work full-time usually receive benefits such as dental coverage, paid sick leave and vacation time. Some pharmacists can also earn bonuses or participate in profit-sharing programs.

Most pharmacists work approximately 40 to 50 hours per week. Working in community pharmacies may require evening and weekend work. Pharmacists working in hospitals may work rotating shifts.

2. Skills, Education and Experience

Skills

- Strong written and verbal communication skills
- Good manual dexterity
- Good mathematical and computer skills
- Strong ethical sense
- Enjoy personal interaction

Education and Experience

Pharmacists require:

- Bachelor of science degree in pharmacy
- Pass a board examination, Pharmacy Examination Board of Canada
- Practical training under the supervision of a pharmacist
- Registration with the College of Pharmacists of BC
- New pharmacists must pass an English Language Fluency exam

Qualifications

Pharmacist is a regulated profession in BC

You must be registered with the *College of Pharmacists of British Columbia* in order to work as a pharmacist in BC.

- Step 2 Pre-register as an applicant with the College of Pharmacists of British

- **Step 3** Successfully complete the English Language Proficiency requirements set by the College of Pharmacists of British Columbia

- Step 5 Successfully complete the Structured Practical Training Program- part of the Canadian Pharmacy Practice Program (CP3)
 Structured Practical Training (SPT) program provides students with the opportunity to gain Canadian pharmacy practice experience

Click on "Start Search" beside Canadian Businesses, then select the "Advanced Search" button. Select both "Keyword/SIC/NAICS" under Business Type and "City" under Geography. In the top search box enter "pharmacies" and click SEARCH. Select the appropriate headings. Lower down, select the Province, choose the cities, and click the "View Results" button.

NOTE: You can access this database from a Library computer. If you are using a computer from outside the Library, you will need a Vancouver Public Library card to login to this database. After clicking on the database name, you will be asked to enter your library card number and PIN (usually last four digits of your telephone number).

4. Applying for a Job

In Canada, employers usually expect to receive a resume (curriculum vitae) and a cover letter that identifies the position you are applying for and summarizes your relevant experience.
