Ancestry.com Now Available at VPL!

One of the most popular subscription databases for genealogy is now available for free at the Vancouver Public Library. **Ancestry.com**, or, as it is known in public library settings, **Ancestry Library Edition**, contains thousands of useful resources for genealogists. Highlights include:

- 1871-1901 U.K. census images and indexes (complete indexes for 1881 and 1891; partial indexes for 1871 and 1901)
- 1790-1930 U.S. census images and indexes (complete indexes for all years except 1901 – partial only)
- Pallot's Baptism Index, 1780-1837 and Pallot's Marriage Index, 1780-1837 – parish records of baptisms and marriages in the Greater London area

Unlike most Vancouver Public Library databases, **Ancestry** cannot be used from home. It is available, however, during opening hours at any of the 22 branches in the VPL system. For locations and hours, see **www.vpl.ca/general/hours.html**

British Resources on the Web

DocumentsOnline

www.documentsonline.nationalarchives.gov.uk

A service at Britain's National Archives now provides online access to a large collection of digitized public records, including family history sources. The index can be searched for free, while it costs £ 3.50 to download a digital image. Collection highlights include more than 5 million First World War Medal index cards for the British Army and Royal Flying Corps; records of over 100,000 World War II medal claimed and issued to Merchant Seamen from 1946-2000; and a complete collection of over 1 million wills of the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, covering the period from 1384-1858

A useful complement to GENUKI (the premier U.K. genealogical research site), UKBMD offers links to many websites that provide online transcriptions of U.K. birth marriage and death records. The transcriptions are based on a variety of sources, including parish registers, burial records, and civil registration. Census information is also included.



Genealogists are collectors of ancestors and relatives. As research progresses and more family branches are identified, the number of known ancestors increases. Meanwhile, the use of the Internet for the exchange of genealogical information often brings genealogists quickly and directly into contact with contemporary though distant family members. But whether past or present, it's sometimes difficult to determine the exact nature of the connection between vourself and a relative. What about the person who emailed you from Tennessee, whose greatgrandfather is your great-great grandfather? Is she your third, fourth, or fifth cousin? Or is she "removed"?

Most people don't have trouble with the idea of "first cousins". The children of brothers and sisters are first cousins to each other. The children of first cousins are second cousins to each other, the children of second cousins are third cousins to each other, and so it continues. Thus, if John and Mary are first cousins, and they have children, their children are second cousins. The children's children (John and Mary's grandchildren) are third cousins.

When it comes to the relationship of John's children to Mary herself, as John's first cousin, they are her "first cousins once removed". Similarly, Mary's children are John's "first cousins once removed". The crucial point to understand is that unlike first, second, and third cousins, "removed" cousins are of a different generation. Thus, since Mary is John's first cousin, his children are "removed" from her by one generation. This is what makes them her "first cousins once removed".

The easiest way to determine distant relationships is to refer to the chart at the end of this newsletter.

- Begin by identifying the common ancestor of the two individuals concerned. For example, if your great-aunt (your grandfather's sister) has a son, then the son's grandfather and your greatgrandfather are the same person – your common ancestor. (It might help to draw a diagram of the relationships on a piece of paper).
- Now establish the relationship of each individual to the common ancestor. In the example, one is the grandson and the other (you) is the great-grandson.
- Find these relationships on the opposing sides of the chart, and follow the lines to where they intersect. This will tell you the relationship between the two individuals (in this case, first cousins once removed).

Now you try it!

- 1. At a family reunion, you meet three other people who all have the same greatgrandmother as you. What is your relationship?
- 2. Your mother had a great-aunt whose daughter has just become a grandmother. How are you related to the baby?
- 3. A genealogist contacts you after finding out that his great-grandfather and your greatgreat-grandfather are one and the same. How are you related?

Super-challenge

4. Over the Internet, you meet a relative who is the great-great-grandson of your grandmother's cousin. How are you related?

Answers:

- 3rd cousin, twice removed - 2nd cousin, once removed - 2nd cousin
