New Genealogy CD-ROMs at the Vancouver Public Library

The following CD-ROMs are available for use at the Central Branch. Please request at the Information Desk on Level 6.

Argenteuil County Quebec Catholic Church Marriages from 1840

A database of Roman Catholic marriage records from Argenteuil County, Quebec, covering the period from 1840 to 1960.

British Headquarters Papers 1776-1783

A select index to the names of Loyalists and their associates contained in the <u>British</u> <u>Headquarters Papers</u>, <u>New York City 1774-1783</u> (the Carleton Papers).



Brome County Quebec Catholic Church Marriages from 1840

A database of Roman Catholic marriage records for Brome County, Quebec, covering the period from 1840 to the 1960s.

Courage & Service: Second World War Awards to Canadians

A compilation of information on British and Canadian awards to Canadians. Includes the full text of all citations, concentrating on the Second World War but with bonus databases covering other important periods of the 20th century. Entries include the name, rank, service number as applicable, award, date of gazetting and, in many cases, the list of approving authorities. Many foreign decorations to Canadians are also included, as are air and naval entries containing biographical data, names of ships, stations, dates and durations, and post-war history.

Dictionnaire national des Canadiens français, 1608-1760

Produced by the American-French Genealogical Society, this CD-ROM is an electronic version of a classic French-Canadian genealogical reference work, the "Dictionnarie nationale des canadiens français, 1608-1760", better known as the "Red Drouins".

Ancestry Library Edition New Resources

Ancestry Library Edition (ALE) is a library version of the popular Ancestry.com database. ALE is available to users at all Vancouver Public Library locations. In recent months, ALE has added a large amount of Canadian content. Highlights include:

- 1881 and 1891 census indexes for selected Ontario counties
- 1911 Canadian census index,including links to images of original records
- Biographical Dictionary of Canadian Jewry
- Canadian Genealogy Index, 1600s-1900s

- Ontario birth indexes and records, 1869-1907
- Ontario death indexes and records, 1869-1932
- Ontario marriage indexes, 1858-1899
- Selected Ontario cemetery records

Online access to original images from birth, marriage, and death indexes for England and Wales from 1837-1983 is also now available in ALE. These indexes make it possible to identify exact references needed to order birth, marriage and death records directly from London. Previously, the indexes were only available at the Family Records Centre in London, at LDS Family History Centres (partial), or by online subscription.



B.C. Marriage and Death Updates

Every year, B.C. Archives releases an additional annual set of British Columbia marriage and death records. This year, 1930 marriages and 1985 deaths have been released. Microfilm copies of the records have been ordered and are expected to arrive at Vancouver Public Library shortly.

InterLibrary Loan Tips for VPL Genealogy Patrons

Many Vancouver Public Library genealogy patrons use the InterLibrary Loan service to obtain microfilms and other materials not owned by VPL. Requests can be submitted using the online Interlibrary Loan request form (http://vpl-rss.vpl.ca/). This service is

available to all VPL cardholders. (Most residents of the Lower Mainland area can obtain a free VPL card. For more information, see www.bcpl.gov.bc.ca/interlink/systems/libs.htm)

VPL InterLibrary Loan staff will process requests and order material available from various suppliers, including Archives of Ontario, Library and Archives Canada, United Church of Canada and other owning institutions.

Here are some tips for placing Interlibrary Loan requests:

Ask yourself if you really need an InterLibrary Loan.

The information that you need might be available at your fingertips. **Ancestry Library Edition**, a powerful online genealogy resource subscribed to by VPL can be accessed from any VPL branch. It includes indexes and images of U.K. and U.S. census records, the 1911 Census of Canada, 1780-1837 baptism and marriage records for the Greater London area, Ontario birth, marriage and death records and much more! Many original records can be viewed and printed online. Give it a try!



One microfilm reel per request form.

The owning institution will fill requests on a reel-by-reel basis. If you are requesting three reels, you must submit three separate ILL web-forms. If you enter three reels on one form, you may not receive them all.

Provide the reel number.

Owning institutions require a specific reel number in order to process ILL requests. If you do not provide the reel number, Interlibrary Loan staff will need to contact you and this will lengthen the time it takes to obtain the reel.

Be aware of order limits. Due to the high demand for genealogy microforms, requests to the Archives of Ontario are limited to three reels at one time. Requests to Library and Archives Canada are limited to six. After you have returned the reels, you may submit more requests.

Talk to library staff.

If you need assistance, library staff in Fine Arts & History on Level 6 will be happy to show you various genealogical resources and help you complete InterLibrary Loan requests properly.



Don't Tell the Girls: A Family Memoir

A beautifully written family memoir, Patricia Reilly Giff's Don't Tell the Girls describes the strong bond between the author and her grandmother. Warm recollections of "Nana" inspired Giff - a leading American children's writer - to learn more about her other grandmother, whom she had never met. The story of the author's genealogical quest, which took her to the public library to pore through microfilm, and eventually to Ireland, is woven with anecdotes and period details into a gentle, affecting narrative. **Don't Tell the Girls** is highly recommended for all ages, and would be a wonderful book to share with children and grandchildren. 
Buried at the B.C. Pen

Genealogy Resources for British Columbians

Better late than never for this news . . . a 2004 revision of *Genealogy Resources for British Columbians* is available online. Formerly published by the B.C. Archives under the slightly different title *Genealogical Resources for British Columbians*, it has been revised, and provides a comprehensive guide to a wide range of B.C. resources. Genealogists were delighted when Bill S-18 passed Parliament, enabling release of the 1911 Canadian census. Unfortunately, the same piece of legislation created an obstacle for future generations of family historians. In future censuses, people will be given the option of allowing their census information to be released to the public after 92 years. Unless the respondent answers "yes", the information collected will be withheld from future researchers forever. This is problematic from several points-of-view, in particular, the fact that the head of household who completes the form will respond on behalf of all members of the household, including children who are unable to give informed consent. In any event, genealogists are encouraged to be sure to answer "yes" to the confidentiality question. Tuesday, May 16 is census day. Be sure to opt-in . . . and spread the word!

New Canadian Genealogy Centre Databases

The Canadian Genealogy Centre (www.genealogy.gc.ca) has recently added three new resources to its suite of free searchable online databases. All three databases can be searched by name and results are linked to digitized images of original records.



Montreal Emigrant Society Passage Book (1932)

www.collectionscanada.ca/archivianet/mes/index-e.html

The Montreal Emigrant Society was established in 1831. Its main purpose was to provide transportation to poor immigrants who had come to Montreal from Quebec City and were destined to settle in other parts of Upper and Lower Canada. The database is derived from a register of names of immigrants for the year 1832.

Port of New Westminster – Register of Chinese Immigration (1887-1908) www.collectionscanada.ca/archivianet/new-westminster/index-e.html

The federal immigration department kept detailed records of Chinese immigrants to Canada, including port registers of new arrivals. This database comprises 470 records of Chinese who arrived at the port of New Westminster, B.C.

Upper Canada and Canada West Naturalization Records (1828-1850) http://www.collectionscanada.ca/ archivianet/naturalization/index-e.html

This database provides access to 2967 references to individuals who became naturalized British subjects in what is now Ontario during the period from 1828-1850.

Saskatchewan Birth Indexes Online

A searchable online index to Saskatchewan birth records is now available. The index provides unrestricted access to birth records of people born in Saskatchewan more than 100 years ago. If you find a relevant entry in the birth indexes and would like to apply for a copy of the corresponding full birth registration record, a printable application form can be completed and sent to Saskatchewan Vital Statistics with payment. Montreal Directories Online

The Bibliothèque et archives nationale du Québec has put Lovell's Montreal directories online as PDFs. Currently, all directories from 1842 to 1950 are online, with the exception of 1851. 1951 to 1999 are underway. The files are not searchable by name, but can be browsed by date. Canadian Letters & Images Project: "In Their Own Words"

The Canadian Letters & Images Project will be of interest to researchers with ancestors who fought in Canada's wars. Based in the Department of History at Malaspina University College in Nanaimo, B.C., and in partnership with the History Department at the University of Western Ontario, the goal of the project is to allow soldiers to tell their own stories by preserving correspondence, photographs and other memorabilia. Project Roots

Project Roots is a humanitarian initiative aimed at reuniting long-lost Canadian fathers with their children born to British and European mothers in the aftermath of World War II. The project was founded in 1980 and is based in Haarlem in the Netherlands. So far, Project Roots has reunited 4000 war children with their Canadian fathers. The Project Roots website tells the story of the Canadian war children, and profiles reunion success stories as well as unsolved cases. For more information, see www.project-roots.com/

The National Archive of Memorial Inscriptions

Researchers with British ancestors may want to keep an eye on The National Archive of Memorial Inscriptions (NAOMI) project. NAOMI is supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund and based at De Montfort University in Bedford, England. The aim of the project is to transcribe memorial inscriptions and make them available on the Internet. Users will be able to search for free, and for a small fee, to download and print the transcription of a memorial, a photograph of the church or chapel, a plan of the burial ground, and usually some historical information. The database is so far very small, containing only 70,000 inscriptions from 218 burial grounds in Norfolk. Most are associated with the Church of England, but non-conformist, war memorials, and other cemeteries are also included. British Library - Services for Family History Researchers

The collections of the British Library (BL) offer a vast wealth of material for family historians. To help researchers access these resources, the BL offers three services which can be ordered online:

Newspaper Search Service

£50. BL staff will search up to four newspapers of a specified date for birth, marriage and death notices and obituaries, reports of weddings and funerals, court reports, crime reports, and miscellaneous news items. More information: newspaper@bl.uk

Elector Register Search Service £39. BL staff will check one address in one

register (up to 2001). More information: research@bl.uk

India Office Baptisms, Marriages and Burials Search Service

£35.25. BL staff will search for specific records of European and Eurasian Christians in South Asia and other territories controlled by the English East India Company from 1698 to the 1960s. More information: oioc-enquiries@bl.uk

A Vision of Britain Through Time

This excellent website should be noted by anyone with a genealogical interest in towns and villages throughout Britain, and will be especially useful for determining how the names and boundaries associated with various places have changed. Scottish Family History Centre

A new £I.6 million Scottish Family History
Centre is expected to be fully operational this
year. The Centre will consolidate services
previously provided separately by the General
Register Office for Scotland, National Archives
of Scotland, and the Court of the Lord Lyon.
The new Scottish Family History Centre will
span the two landmark buildings currently
occupied by the General Register House and
New Register House in Edinburgh.

News From Salt Lake City

An exciting initiative is underway at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. Billions of names preserved on microfilm at the LDS Church's Granite Mountain Vault Records facility are being converted into digital images. Eventually, it will be possible to view the images online at **FamilySearch.org**, and ultimately they will be linked to an online index. Previously, it was estimated that it would take about 120 years to convert the microfilms to digitized images, but a new FamilySearch Scanning technology has greatly accelerated the process.

The Family History Library has also announced a massive digital indexing project.
The goal is to compile searchable indexes to films held by the FHL at the Library and at Granite Mountain vault. Volunteers are needed for a project of this magnitude. Those interested in participating can e-mail FCH-InternetIndexing@ldschurch.org





Immigrant Ancestors Project

The Immigrant Ancestors Project, sponsored by the Center for Family History and Genealogy at Brigham Young University, focuses on a resource little-known and seldomused by genealogists – emigration records. Many genealogists are familiar with immigration records created in destination countries – passengers lists, border entry records and the like. Emigration records, on the other hand - created in immigrants' home countries - are difficult to identify and access. Project researchers and students are travelling throughout Europe to locate records that may fill gaps in immigration records. Once located, records are copied and indexed. The project currently comprises 6 sub-projects: British, French, German, Italian, Spanish, and Portuguese. Led by a professional team at BYU, the project uses volunteers to extract and transcribe information. Copyright and Family History

Genealogists do a lot of copying from books and microfilm. Digital cameras are also often used to preserve images of documents and memorabilia. Eventually, many family historians decide to publish their work on a website, on CD, in a book, or simply in a personal album. Sometimes, another person wants to use a genealogist's original work for the purposes of their own project. How does copyright apply in these situations? It's important to understand the basics of copyright law so that you can comply with it in terms of

your own research, and protect your work from unauthorized use by others.

Copyright laws vary from one country to another, but the basics are usually similar. For details of Canadian copyright law, see:
