Genealogy, Geography and Maps: Using Atlases and Gazetteers to Find Your Family (2006) Douglas, Althea 929.371 D73g

Family historians need maps. As the author notes in the introduction to this outstanding new book, "genealogy, geography, and maps are inextricably entwined". <u>Genealogy, Geography and Maps</u> explains map

vocabulary, explores accuracy, describes how place names change, and provides an overview of many kinds of maps and related resources. While there are many books on maps, this title is exceptional in its focus on the subject from a genealogical perspective and use of Canadian examples. Now available at the Vancouver Public Library, <u>Genealogy</u>, <u>Geography and Maps</u> is an invaluable resource for family historians.

### Speaking of Maps ...

**The Atlas of Canada** provides access to an extensive range of electronic Canadian map resources covering many themes, including history. There are also clear, printable outline maps, and a Map Archives, with digitized versions of previous editions of the <u>National Atlas of Canada</u> and its predecessor, the <u>Atlas of Canada</u>. The earliest edition dates from 1906.

### New B.C. Records on Microfilm at VPL

The VPL genealogy collection recently acquired two new sets of B.C. records on microfilm. Using these films, researchers can locate early B.C. coroners' reports and index references to divorce orders.

The **coroners' records** are on 3 microfilms, covering the period from 1859-1892. The **divorce indexes** comprise a series of indexes on 6 microfilms covering the period from 1901-1983. The indexes can be used to establish the existence of a divorce order. Copies of actual divorce orders are available at the B.C. Archives in Victoria.

The coroners' records and divorce indexes are on the microfilm racks in the genealogy area on Level 6 at the Central Branch.

New pages on Canadian military and church records have been added to the Vancouver Public Library's Genealogy pages. ### Latest Release of Ontario BMD Indexes -Available Now at VPL

The most recent annual release of indexes to Ontario birth, marriage and death records is now available at the Vancouver Public Library. The new release provides references to the following records:

- 1909 births
- 1924 marriages
- 1934 deaths

The indexes can be consulted whenever the library is open. If an index entry of interest is located, a microfilm copy of the full corresponding original record can be ordered from the Archives of Ontario through free interlibrary loan.

### New Guide - Finding Ontario Civil Registration Records

Civil registration in Ontario began in 1869. Registrations and related indexes are available in a variety of formats – microfilm, print, and electronic. ### New from Ancestry

Ancestry Library Edition (ALE) has added a significant amount of new genealogical data over the past few months.

Recent additions include an **every-name index to the 1851 Canadian census**. This census covered modern Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick.

Those with Scottish roots may be interested in the recent expansion of census data in ALE to include **indexes to 1851 and 1861 Scottish census records**. Unlike other Ancestry databases, results do not link to actual images of census records. (These are available for a charge from **Scotlands People**, **www.scotlandspeople.gov.uk**/).

Ancestry also recently released an enormous collection of **historical U.S. immigration records**. The new databases provide access to all readily available U.S. passenger lists from 1820 to 1860 for the ports of New York, Boston, Philadelphia, San Francisco, New Orleans, and Baltimore.

Finally, the U.S., U.K. and Canadian subscription versions of Ancestry for home users have been joined by Australian and German versions, available at **www.ancestry.com.au** and **www.ancestry.de** respectively.

**Ancestry Library Edition** is available for free at all Vancouver Public Library locations.

### CanGenealogy.com

This new website from well-known B.C. genealogist Dave Obee provides links to a range of Canadian genealogical resources. Links are limited to those believed to be of the greatest value to researchers, and are ranked, with the most important ones at the top. Usability and absence of pop-up ads and other annoyances are also important criteria. Check out this useful new directory of Canadian genealogical resources at www.cangenealogy.com

# WorldCat – Focus on Genealogy

WorldCat is the world's largest bibliographic database, with records of the content of more than 50,000 libraries in over 90 countries. It is maintained by the Online Computer Library Center. As of April 2006, the database contained more than 63 million records corresponding to physical and digital items in more than 360 languages. With such a large database, WorldCat is a potential goldmine of genealogical information.

VPL users do not have direct access to WorldCat, but you can ask a librarian to search WorldCat on your behalf for items that might be of value to your genealogical research. If items of interest are located, you can check to see if they are available at VPL. If not, WorldCat offers a tool you can use to identify the nearest library holding the item by using your postal code.

### Mountain View Newsletter

Vancouver's historic Mountain View Cemetery recently launched a new electronic newsletter, <u>Memento Mori</u>. The newsletter chronicles the cemetery's history and provides information about ongoing development at the cemetery. About 150,000 people are buried in the cemetery, which was established in 1886.



### New Canadian Genealogy Centre Databases



The Canadian Genealogy Centre's suite of online databases continues to grow, with the recent addition of three new electronic resources, available at **www.genealogy.gc.ca**:

**Canadian Passenger Lists, 1865-1922** offers free access to digitized images of passenger manifestos from ships arriving at the following ports:

- Québec City (includes Montréal)

   May 1, 1865 to July 13, 1921
- Halifax, Nova Scotia
  - o January 1881 to October 2, 1922
- Saint John, New Brunswick
  - January 4, 1900 to September 30, 1922
- North Sydney, Nova Scotia
  - November 22, 1906 to August 31, 1922
- Vancouver, British Columbia
  - January 4, 1905 to September 28, 1922
- Victoria, British Columbia
  - April 18, 1905 to September 30, 1922

The database can be searched by Name of Ship, Port of Arrival, Shipping Line, and Port of Departure. It is not possible to search for an individual person, but the full passenger lists can be browsed online. (Some passenger lists have been indexed by the Nanaimo Family History Society, see http://members.shaw.ca/nanaimo.fhs/)

The Ward Chipman, Muster Master's Office (1777-1785) database comprises nearly 19,000 references to Loyalist families from the papers of Ward Chipman the Elder (1754-1824), who served as an army administrator in New York State between 1777 and 1783, later re-settling in New Brunswick. The papers

include muster rolls of soldiers who had remained loyal to Britain during the American Revolution and eventually settled in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The database includes digitized images of the documents.

### The Likacheff-Ragosine-Mathers (LI-RA-MA)

**Collection** comprises about 11,400 records created between 1898-1922 by consular offices of the Russian Empire in Canada. The records relate to Jewish, Ukrainian and Finnish immigrants to Canada from the Russian Empire, and include passport applications and questionnaires.

### Daniel F. Johnson's New Brunswick Newspaper Vital Statistics

A wonderful recent addition to the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick (PANB) website, **Daniel F. Johnson's New Brunswick Newspaper Vital Statistics** provides free electronic access to thousands of vital statistics entries from all English-language New Brunswick newspapers, 1784-1896. Started as a project of the New Brunswick Genealogical Society in 1982, it was continued singlehandedly by Daniel Johnson after the project finished in 1985. Johnson eventually produced 102 volumes before his death in 2005. The database is available at:

### Alberta Roots

For those interested in Alberta roots, the Provincial Archives of Alberta now offers access to its holdings through the Heritage Resource Management Information System (HeRMIS). HeRMIS allows users to search descriptions of archival materials, view photographs, watch archival films, and search the library database.

### News Flash - Early Release of U.K. 1911 Census Records

Full release of 1911 U.K. census records is scheduled for 2012, but the National Archives (U.K.) recently announced two services that will be available in advance of that date.

As the result of a decision by the Information Commissioner in favour of a complainant whose request for 1911 census records has been rejected by the National Archives, some information is now being made available in response to Freedom of Information requests. A search will cost £45, and a specific address must be supplied.

In 2009, the National Archives will offer a searchable online service providing access to most data from 1911 census records.

### Digitization of GRO Records

The General Register Office, which administers the registration of births, marriages and deaths in the United Kingdom, has awarded a contract for the scanning, digitizing, and indexing of over 250 million birth, marriage and death records, dating from 1837 to the present.

Unlike in Scotland, where members of the public can directly access digitized images of birth, marriage and death records until about 50 years ago, using **Scotland's People**, the current legislative framework in U.K. only allows the GRO to provide information to the public in the form of a certificate. The GRO **Digitisation of Vital Events (DoVE)** project will nonetheless benefit genealogists by streamlining the certificate production process.

### FreeBMD Update



**FreeBMD** is well-known to genealogists researching British roots. Designed as a tool to help genealogists access British birth, marriage and death records, <u>FreeBMD</u> is a free electronic index to British birth, marriage and death records. The electronic index entries are derived from printed indexes at the Family Records Centre in London. The project's ultimate aim is to include information from all indexes covering the period from 1837-1983. FreeBMD recently added 4.6 million new transcriptions. The addition of these records almost completes the entry of information from the 1837-1911 indexes. www.freebmd.org.uk/

### Was Your Ancestor an Anglican Clergyman?

If your ancestor was a minister in the Church of England, an online guide on **Biographical Sources for Anglican Clergy** produced by the Lambeth Palace Library may be useful for your research. Lambeth Palace Library is the historic library of the Archbishops of Canterbury and the principal library and record office for the history of the Church of England. ### Society of Genealogists – Index to the Surname Document Collection

The London-based Society of Genealogists' **Surname Document Collection** is a large collection of unbound material comprising original documents associated with individuals (birth, marriage and death certificates, deeds, wills, marriage licences and settlements, apprenticeship indentures, letters etc.) as well as manuscript and typescript transcripts of wills, parish register entries, family trees and other research notes.

A new online **Index to the Surname Document Collection** is now available, listing all surnames represented in the collection. The Index is available at www.sog.org.uk/library/ surnames\_intro.shtml.

This unique British site offers a means of seeking and exchanging information based on place name rather than surname. Users enter the name of a town or village and are taken to a page listing messages from Curious Fox users with genealogical interests in the area.

Basic membership in Curious Fox is free. This allows full access to all messages and the ability to reply to messages posted by paid members. Enhanced features are available for a modest annual rate of 5 pounds. Curious Fox also provides links to series of historic and modern map resources for each location: www.curiousfox.org.uk/



### Gazetteer of British Place Names

Genealogists looking for the location of specific towns, villages and hamlets in Great Britain or trying to find out what repository holds documents relevant to their genealogical research may find answers in the Gazetteer of British Place Names. With over 50,000 entries, this electronic database, produced by the Association of British Counties, aims to include the name of every settlement with a distinct name and identity (not including isolated houses and farmsteads). Place names are entered into a simple search box. Results consist of 8 columns including the Place Name, National Grid Reference, County, Administrative County, District, Unitary Authority Area, Police Area, and County/Region. If you need specific information on Victorian London or would just like to get more insight into the Victorian era, Lee Jackson's website, **The Victorian Dictionary: Exploring Victorian London** offers a wealth of information on the subject. The site is not so much a dictionary as a compilation of primary material on a diverse range of topics --Childhood, Education, Houses and Housing, Markets and others. Other changes to FamilySearch are on the horizon. In the next few months, a complete overhaul of the site is planned. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints is also moving forward on a digitization project which involves putting images of original records currently on 2.4 million rolls of microfilm on the web and creating indexes to provide instant access.



Roots Television was launched in September 2006. An example of Internet television, Roots Television offers users the opportunity to watch a variety of high-quality content according to their own schedule. Content currently featured on Roots Television includes a new series entitled "Ancestors, Writing a Family History", an interview with genealogical author Hank Jones, an intriguingly titled series of shorts called "Extreme Genealogy", and a program about military and census records. ### World Vital Records

World Vital Records is a new fee-based website, aimed at becoming "the number two genealogy player in the industry" (after Ancestry.com). Special features include **Geo Mapping**, a unique feature that places information relevant to a search on a dynamically generated map. For example, when searching for a surname, a map might be created showing the location of an individual's death and the deaths of other individuals in the local area, as well as nearby towns, roads, and other relevant information.

The online **SmallTownPapers** offers searchable access to over 300 small town newspapers from across the United States, dating back as far as 1865.

Other exclusive content includes **Scottish Death Records, 1747-1868**, online genealogy classes, a genealogy blog aggregator, and more. Although current content is currently strongly focused on the U.S., World Vital Records plans to expand its international coverage.

### Archived Newspaper Searches on Google

A new service from Google allows searching of historical newspapers from as early as 200 years ago. Keywords are entered into a search box, with data parameters, if desired. Results are arranged by period, and may be displayed as a timeline. At present, the amount of early content is limited, and most references retrieved by searches will be from newspapers 10 or less years old. But it is worth checking, as more early content may eventually come online. Google News Archive Search is free to use. However, in many cases, results point to information residing on commercial fee-based sites. In the Advanced option, it is possible limit results to free articles or to set a price ceiling.
