

### Vancouver Public Library Launches B.C. Directories Database

Digital versions of historic British Columbia directories are now available on the Vancouver Public Library website through a project funded by the Irving K. Barber Learning Centre's B.C. History Digitization Program. The online collection comprises over 60 directories spanning the period from 1860-1901. Coverage includes province-wide directories and directories for individual municipalities. The directories can easily be browsed using the detailed table-of-contents at the left of each screen. Ancestry Library Edition, produced by Generations Network, is available for free at all Vancouver Public Library locations. During the past few months, there have been several exciting new developments at Ancestry.

### **Database of Canadian Passenger Lists,** 1865-1935 Launched

In mid-September, Ancestry launched an online database of Canadian passenger lists, spanning the years from 1865-1935. The database, which documents the arrival of passengers at Canadian ports, contains more than 7.2 million names. The passenger lists have been fully indexed and digitized, allowing users to search the database and link to images of original records associated with individual passenger names. Canadian ports of arrival represented in the database include Halifax, Saint John, North Sydney, Quebec City, Montreal, Vancouver, Victoria, and even some East Coast U.S. ports where some passengers arrived before proceeding overland to Canada. The main immigrant nationalities were British, Irish, Ukrainian, Russian, German, Chinese and Polish.



#### 1891 Canadian Census Records Now Online

In July Ancestry launched the first comprehensive electronic database of Canadian 1891 census records ever released. The database includes 4.5 million names and is fully searchable. Entries are linked to images of original census records.

### **Drouin Records Indexed by Name**

The Drouin Collection is named for Gabriel Drouin, a notary and genealogist who in the 1930s microfilmed registers kept by Roman Catholic, Protestant and Jewish congregations in Quebec. The millions of records in the Collection are a major source of information on births, marriages and deaths in Quebec from 1621-1967.

In 2007, online access to digitized records of the Drouin Collection became available through a partnership between Ancestry and the Université de Montréal. In its initial phase, the database could only be searched using broad parameters such as place and denomination. Recently, however, a nominal index has been added, allowing users to search for individuals by name. This major improvement enables much more efficient searching.

Related Ancestry databases provide similar access to Quebec notarial records and to records from French-Canadian parishes in Ontario, the Maritimes and New England.



#### **Ancestry to Host London Records**

Ancestry has secured exclusive online rights to the largest collection of London records in existence. The agreement between Ancestry and the City of London permits Ancestry to digitize and host key records from the London Metropolitan Archives and Guildhall Library Manuscripts collections. The collections include parish records, school records, electoral registers, wills, lists of workhouse labourers and a comprehensive list of those granted "Freedom of the City." While the project is expected to take several years, the first records are expected to launch in early 2009. Parish records, Poor Law documents and London school admissions will be prioritized.

# News from Library and Archives Canada

### Second World War Service Files: Canadian Armed Forces War Dead

Over 1,159,000 men and women served in the Canadian Armed Forces during World War II. While most records associated with these individuals are sealed due to privacy restrictions, service files of 44,093 individuals who died between 1939 and 1947 are open to the public. The collection covers those killed in action, those who subsequently died of injuries related to service, and those who died as a result of accident or illness while in service.

A new database created by Library and Archives Canada facilitates access to these files. Searches of the database provide information about each individual including age, date of birth, date of death, rank, unit, force, and service number. In some cases extra information, such as the names of the deceased individual's parents and / or spouse is also included. Using information located in the database, genealogists can order photocopies of actual service files from Library and Archives Canada.

#### **New 1881 Canadian Census Database**

In August, Library and Archives Canada launched a new online database, <u>Census of Canada</u>, <u>1881</u>. While LAC already provides access to online images of the 1851, 1901, 1906 and 1911 censuses, the records can only be searched geographically. The new 1881 census database is the first LAC census database to include an index allowing users to search for individuals by name.

In making the announcement, Library and Archives Canada acknowledged the important contributions of Statistics Canada and FamilySearch. FamilySearch is the non-profit organization based in Salt Lake City, Utah that created the original index to the 1881 Canadian census and made it available to Library and Archives Canada.

#### 1916 Census Released

In August, Library and Archives Canada released records of the 1916 Census of the Western Provinces. The records cover the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. A similar census had taken place 10 years previously in 1906.

Records of the 1916 Census of the Western Provinces have not been digitized and are currently available only on microfilm (32 reels). The microfilms have not been acquired by the Vancouver Public Library, but VPL card holders can borrow the reels using VPL's interlibrary loan service. #### **Doukhobor Family Research Initiative**

Library and Archives Canada and Jonathan J. Kalmakoff, creator of the Doukhobor Genealogy Website (www.doukhobor.org), have announced a strategic partnership aimed at making more resources available to Canadians interested in online Doukhobor family research.

The project will initially focus on identifying Doukhobor archival material available at LAC and creating a thematic guide. The guide will be available online at no cost. A specialized web page for Doukhobor genealogy will also be developed and hosted on the Library and Archives Canada website.

# Deeply Rooted: The Story of One Senator's Battle to Preserve the Historic Census Results

Senator Lorna Milne is well-known to the Canadian genealogy community for her tireless efforts to secure uncensored public access to historical Canadian census records. She and a small but determined group of Canadians were ultimately successful in reversing a decision by the Government of Canada to permanently withhold access to historical census records. The process of securing public access to post-1901 census records took seven years and involved many obstacles and delays. The full story is recounted by Senator Milne in a book recently published online, Deeply Rooted: The Story of One Senator's Battle to Preserve the Historic Census Results. ### Toronto Star Historic Photographs

Almost 52,000 historic photographs from the <u>Toronto Star</u> newspaper are available online at **www.torstarphotos.com**. The database comprises images representing life in Toronto for the past century. Searching and previewing photographs is free. Preview images include a large "Toronto Star" watermark but prints without the watermark can be purchased in a wide range of sizes.

Although not intended specifically for genealogical purposes, the above series may be useful when attempting to connect ancestors and places in Alberta, British Columbia, Manitoba, Ontario, Saskatchewan and Yukon Territory. Compiled from municipal and business directories, each title lists the names and operating dates of thousands of professional photographers and photographic studios in hundreds of villages, towns and cities.

The series offers a possible solution for genealogists faced with unlabelled, undated photographs. If the name of the photographer or studio appears on the photo, it may be possible to associate it with a specific location and range of dates . . . perhaps taking the

researcher one step closer to positively identifying that elusive ancestor.

### Record Search Pilot -



As described in previous issues of this newsletter, FamilySearch continues to develop its free online collection of indexed genealogical data with links to digitized images of original records.

# Free Online Access to Griffiths Valuation

Online access to <u>Griffith's Valuation</u>, a detailed record of people and property in mid-19th-century Ireland, is now available free of charge. The information had previously been available for a fee on subscription websites, but funding from the Library Council of Ireland has now made the records widely available at no cost.

Due to the mass destruction of 19th-century Irish census records, <u>Griffith's Valuation</u> is a very important "census substitute." The <u>Valuation</u> covers the period from 1847-1864 and documents every landholder and householder in the 32 counties of Ireland.

The new database includes a fully searchable index. Results are linked to image scans of the original document and to maps showing the location of each landowner or householder.

### Deceased Online

#### www.deceasedonline.com

A new central database of statutory burial and cremation data for the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland provides access to records that were previously available only through registers held separately by burial authorities and crematoria.

Launched in July 2008, Deceased Online comprises records dating from 1837 onwards and can be searched for free.

Summary results include the name of the deceased and date and site of burial. The availability of extra information is also indicated. Users can view this "extra information" by purchasing credits. Extra information may include:

- Full register details
- Grave details and other burials in the grave
- Burial/cremation register scan
- Photograph of a Memorial
- Photograph of a Grave
- Map(s) to show the position of a grave or memorial
- Scan of a Book of Remembrance page

The site is new and so far includes only data associated with the **Kent & Sussex Crematorium** and the **Tunbridge Wells Borough Cemetery**.

# Putting Your Name on the Map



### www.publicprofiler.org/worldnames/

A new site set up by geographers at University College London claims to "provide a remarkable tool for tracing family history and also a powerful aid for governments to keep track of intra-national and international migrations."

Using Worldnames, the user can type in a surname and generate a global map showing the frequency-per-million of the surname in 26 countries. Clicking on the name of an individual country displays more detailed results-by-country which can be further filtered to show results for individual administrative divisions such as counties and provinces. The site also shows the Top Countries, Top Regions, Top Cities, and Top Forenames associated with the selected surname.

The database contains 1.8 million individual surnames and covers most of Europe and Anglophone countries as well as Japan, India and Argentina. Most of the rest of the globe is unrepresented.

# GENUKI Church Database

GENUKI is one of the best-known and most popular websites for British Isles genealogical research. Although its information resources are organized primarily according to a geographical hierarchy, the site includes many added features. One useful such feature is the GENUKI Church Database. Using the database, genealogists can enter a place name or Ordnance Survey grid reference and optionally specify a county name. Results show the names of churches in descending order beginning with the one closest to the specified location. Results can also be displayed on a Google map.

Users are invited to contribute further details about each church, including exact location, name of the street or road on which is located, details as to whether it is operational or has closed, pictures, year of foundation, URL (if available), and information about its graveyard.



# More Parish Records at Findmypast.com



The popular British subscription website **findmypast** recently expanded the coverage of church registers in its Parish Records Collection. Available records now cover the period from 1538-2005 and include baptism, marriage and burial data.

# DNA and Genealogy

Many genealogists use DNA technology to trace their roots - and in some cases, bore through brickwalls. Genealogy-related DNA research is based on "Y" DNA which is passed down from father to son, with only minor mutations occurring every few generations. If two males carry identical Y-DNA, this means that they have a common male ancestor. The challenge then is to identify this common male ancestor using documentary evidence.

### **Blogs**

A blog is a website, typically maintained by an individual, that is regularly updated with entries that are posted in reverse chronological order. Some blogs offer news and commentary while others are similar to personal diaries.

You can also create your own blog using one of several free online services (to find such a service, Google "**create blog**"). Blogs have a variety of potential uses for genealogists. They can be used, for example, to share information and track progress on research projects related to specific surnames or locations. Genealogical associations can also use blogs to provide members with running updates on upcoming events and other activities.



#### **Podcasts**

Podcasts are a widely used method of disseminating music, information and educational material in audio format ("vodcasts" using video are also becoming popular). Podcasters create programs which are essentially pre-recorded shows that are then made available on the Internet.

Anyone can access and download a pod from its website to his or her computer. From there, the file can be transferred to an MP3 player (the Apple family of MP3 players, including the famous iPOD are possibly the best known MP3 players, but many other brands are available).

Once the podcast has been loaded on the MP3 player, the user can listen to it at his or her convenience - while riding the bus, working out, or lying on the beach.

Most podcasts are free and for those who don't have an MP3 player, it is possible to listen directly at the pod's web address or burn the program onto a CD that can be played in a car or on a portable CD player.

### Fraudulent Genealogies

For serious genealogists, evidence and proof is of primary importance when establishing the facts concerning one's ancestral line. The process can be rigorous but ultimately satisfying. Others, however, are easily tempted by the prospect of discovering their roots with little or no effort. These individuals are susceptible to opportunists offering products for sale such as family coats-of-arms (a misnomer, as authentic coats-of-arms are issued to individuals, not families) and items purporting to present ancient family lineages.



Although fraudulent genealogy abounds, it is not new. Perhaps its best-known practitioner was Gustav Anjou (1863-1942) who was employed by many families on the East Coast of the U.S. to research their genealogies. His

clients were pleased by the detailed reports he produced concerning their lineages. Anjou's fees were high and he did well. The problem was that he made up some of the facts. Although Anjou genealogies mostly cited documents that actually existed and included the information that he said they did, he sometimes nullified the accuracy of an entire genealogy by including a reference to an invented, uncited document in order to support other connections and linkages that he wanted to make. At the time, Anjou was respected and the results of his tainted work seeped into the collective body of U.S. genealogical research.

Although Anjou committed his errors deliberately, genealogy fraud is sadly often unintentional, especially in the era of online genealogy. Many inexperienced genealogists rush their way through genealogy databases, making linkages between individuals which seem logical but which have not been corroborated and are inaccurate. The results of this "research" are accepted as fact and exchanged with others – often by e-mail – who may similarly pass it along uncritically. Claims of having traced one's family back 7 generations and identified thousands of ancestors after 30 minutes of Internet research are, unfortunately, not uncommon.

Whether such misrepresentation occurs intentionally or otherwise, the lesson is clear for serious genealogists who want to avoid adding fake branches to their family tree. Whatever its source, information should never be accepted at face value. All data should be critically evaluated and verified and wherever possible, reference should be made to original documents.
