

### New from



Ancestry Library Edition is a popular database available to Vancouver Public Library users at all branch locations.

#### **The Historical Canadian Census Collection**

In June, Ancestry launched new 1861, 1871 and 1881 Canadian census databases. With these additions, Ancestry's online collection of historical Canadian census records now provides complete coverage from 1851 to 1916. All Canadian census databases are searchable by name and results are linked to digital images of original records. While some of the records are also available on other websites, Ancestry is the only online source of comprehensive digitally-linked nominal indexing for the 1851, 1861, 1871 and 1916 censuses.

The project represents the collaborative efforts of Ancestry, Library and Archives Canada and FamilySearch.

### Border Crossings: From U.S. to Canada, 1908-1935

In April, Ancestry added a new immigration database to its collection of Canadian genealogical records. **Border Crossings: From U.S. to Canada, 1908-1935** comprises roughly 1.6 million records of immigrants crossing into Canada from the United States. Records can be searched by name, port of arrival, arrival date, birth year and location and gender. Results are linked to digital images of original records.

#### French Deaths by Guillotine, 1792-1796

To mark Bastille Day (July 14), Ancestry released a grim but unique collection of French records in early July. French Deaths by Guillotine, 1792-1796 (Les guillotinés, France, 1792 à 1796) comprises the names of more than 13,000 individuals executed during the French Revolution, mainly by guillotine. The victims ranged in age from 14 to 92. The database includes some of the most famous individuals associated with the French Revolution – King Louis XVI, Marie Antoinette and Robespierre. Records include date of death, occupation and other facts.



### Hidden Gems

King's Daughters and Founding Mothers: The Filles du Roi, 1663-1673, 2nd ed.

The <u>filles du roi</u> were young French women – about 800 in number – who were sent to New France between 1663-1673 under the auspices of the King of France. The purpose of the program was to provide prospective brides for the men of New France. Young women were desperately needed due to a gender imbalance in the colony that had resulted in a lack of marriageable women.

These two volumes provide detailed information about the <u>filles du roi</u>, including each young woman's date and place of birth, parents' names, date of departure for New France, spouse, date and place of marriage, children, any subsequent marriages, residence(s) and date and place of death.



### Loyalist Genealogy Research Guide

More than two million Canadians trace their roots to the Loyalists.

The Loyalists were colonists who remained loyal to the British Crown during the American Revolutionary War (1775-1783). Eventually, between 80,000 - 100,000 Loyalists fled the former Thirteen Colonies (U.S.). Roughly half settled in the British North American colonies that later became the Dominion of Canada.

The Vancouver Public Library has prepared a detailed guide to help genealogists interested in researching Loyalist ancestors at the Vancouver Public Library and beyond.

The guide points to a large range of print materials in the Vancouver Public Library, as well as records on CD-ROM and in the popular Ancestry Library Edition database. Links to free online resources are also provided.


### Brian W. Hutchison Genealogical Scholarship

### Appointment of New Librarian and Archivist of Canada

In April, Prime Minister Stephen Harper announced the appointment of Daniel J. Caron as the Librarian and Archivist of Canada, effective April 25, 2009.

Prior to his appointment, Daniel Caron was Senior Assistant Deputy Minister, Corporate Management and Horizontal Integration Sector, Library and Archives Canada. Mr. Caron replaces Ian E. Wilson, who has retired from the Public Service but will hold the title of Library and Archivist of Canada Emeritus as President of the International Council on Archives.



# News from the Canadian Genealogy Centre

### Digital Copies of Canadian Expeditionary Force Personnel Files Now Available

One of the Canadian Genealogy Centre's most popular resources is the **Soldiers of the First World War – CEF** database (www.collectionscanada.gc.ca/databases/cef/ index-e.html). The database is a searchable index to over 600,000 personnel forms associated with Canadians who served in the Canadian Expeditionary Force during World War I. The records can be searched by Surname, Given names, and Regimental number.

Search results are linked to digital images of the Attestation Paper or Enlistment Form for each individual. These documents were created at the time that a person volunteered or was drafted into the C.E.F. Attestation Papers include the recruit's name and address, next-of-kin, date and place of birth, occupation, previous military service and distinguishing physical characteristics. Enlistment Forms are simpler and include only the recruit's name, date of recruitment and compliance with requirements for registration.

While the Attestation Papers and (to a lesser extent) Enlistment Forms are a valuable source of genealogical information, additional information may be found in an individual's full personnel file, which may include up to two or three dozen additional forms with information about enlistment, training, medical and dental history, hospitalization, discipline, pay and discharge or notification of death.

Photocopies of personnel files can be ordered by mail or fax using a printable form available on the Soldiers of the First World War – CEF database site. The charge is \$.40 per page. For those who would prefer to receive copies of service files in electronic format, the Canadian Genealogy Centre is piloting a service whereby a digital copy may be ordered instead. When ordering a personnel file, indicate that you would like a digital copy. Digital copies will be supplied (at the same price per page as paper copies) on a compact disk.

#### **New Research Guides**

The Canadian Genealogy Centre has recently added three new research guides to its website.

New **Jewish** and **Polish** genealogy research guides provide information about the history of the Jewish and Polish communities in Canada and detailed descriptions of Library and Archives Canada archival collections of special interest to genealogists. Many records have been microfilmed and are available through interlibrary loan. Information on genealogical data in published sources at Library and Archives Canada is also provided as is information about resources in other institutions and links for online research.

The **Heraldry** guide provides basic information about heraldry and clears the popular misconception that a coat of arms is assigned to a specific family, clan or surname. It describes heraldry resources available at Library and Archives Canada and online.

### On-Site Resources at Library and Archives Canada

Visitors to Ottawa may be interested in a number of genealogical resources that are available only to on-site users at the Canadian Genealogy Centre, Library and Archives Canada, 3<sup>rd</sup> Floor, 395 Wellington Street.

Find My Past database. Find My Past is a rich source of indexes to primary genealogical data for the United Kingdom, including parish records (1538-2005), civil registration (1837-2005), census data (1841-1911) and outbound U.K. passenger lists (1890-1960). For those unable to visit Library and Archives Canada in Ottawa, Find My Past is also available to home users on a pay-as-you-go or subscription basis.

Other resources available for on-site use at Library and Archives Canada include a variety of CD-ROMs. Notable among these is the **Database Parchemin**, comprising summaries of Quebec notarial records from 1626-1784.

# Canadian Civil Service Salaries Online

Familyrelatives.com has launched a searchable database of Canadian civil service records from 1872-1918. In addition to salaries, the records include a large amount of useful genealogical information including:

- Name
- Title
- Salary
- Birth date
- Age
- Date of first appointment
- Department
- Years at post

- Promotion to present rank
- Creed or religion
- Nationality of origin

Searching is free but there is a charge for full access to search results and images.



# Edmonton Historical Photographs

The City of Edmonton, Alberta has greatly expanded its collection of online historical photos and posted them on a new-and-improved website. The site comprises about 25,000 digital images. Future plans include the addition of more photographs, as well as maps, digitized records and finding aids. The online collection is searchable using either a Quick or Advanced search function. Print or scans of images are available for purchase. To search the Edmonton historical photograph collection, go to archivesphotos.edmonton.ca.

# News from FAMILY SEARCH.

### **New Collections Added to Record Search Pilot**

FamilySearch's impressive Record Search Pilot site continues to grow as new databases are created and existing ones are updated, offering unprecedented free access to an international range of genealogical data.

For genealogists with Canadian roots, perhaps the most important additions are comprehensive nominal indexes to 1851, 1861, 1871 and 1891 Canadian census records. With a complete 1881 Canadian census nominal index already long available at www.familysearch.org, this means that full indexes to all five 19<sup>th</sup>-century Canadian national censuses are now freely available online. Search results provide complete references to assist users in locating digital or microfilm images of original census records. For more news about online Canadian census databases, see News from Ancestry (above).

Another notable addition to Record Search Pilot is the site's first online Portuguese collection. The new **Brazil**, **Rio de Janeiro Civil Registration** database includes about 4.5 million searchable digital images of original civil registration (registros civis) records from all municipalities in the state of Rio de Janeiro, with coverage as follows:

- Births, 1889-1930
- Marriages, 1889-1950
- Deaths, 1889-2006

Records cover all the population, both Catholic and non-Catholic.

Databases incorporating millions of historic records from Southern U.S. states have also recently been added to Record Search Pilot, representing marriages and deaths in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia. Event and date coverage vary from state to state. The collection also includes Civil War Pension Index Cards, Florida state census records, Freedman Bank Records, Louisiana War of 1812 Pension Lists. Some databases are indexes only, some are images only, and some are both.

#### **New Records of British Jews**

The **Knowles Collection**, a free popular database of Jewish genealogical data from the British Isles, has been expanded to include over 40,000 records. The database builds on the work of the late Isobel Mordy. It electronically links tens of thousands of individual Jews into family groups. The records come from many sources: censuses, probate records, synagogue birth, marriage and death records, biographies and more. Individuals can add to the collection by contacting its author, Todd Knowles, at **knowlest@familysearch.org**. The file is available for free download as a PAF or GEDCOM file.

### Finding Records of Your Ancestors in England

FamilySearch has produced a new title in its outstanding series of free genealogical research guides focused on specific countries. The 32-page Finding Records of Your Ancestors in England offers a detailed, illustrated introduction to the Research Process, Finding Places, and locating birth and marriage information in civil registration, census and church records.

### A Closer Look at ... Family History Archives

A relatively new and less well-known feature of FamilySearch is the Family History Archives, a digital collection of published genealogy and family history books. In addition to histories of families, it includes county and local histories, cemetery transcriptions, "how-to" books, genealogy magazines, medieval material and other resources. The collection currently comprises over 35,000 items.

The books are from the collections of a number of U.S. libraries but the scope of the Family History Archives is international. Several important U.S. genealogy collections are represented, including the Family History Library (Salt Lake City), Allen County Public Library and Mid-Continent Public Library.

To access the growing collection:

- Go to www.familysearch.org
- Roll your mouse over Search Records in the horizontal blue navigation bar at the top of the page.
- Click on Historical Books in the drop-down list.



To use the Family History Archives, you must have Adobe Flash Player Version 10 installed on your computer. The program can be downloaded for free. The Family History Archives home page provides a link to the site. On the Family History Archives home page, you can search by **Surname**, **Author** or **Title**. You can also enter geographical place-names or subject keywords (e.g. "cemeteries") in the **Search All** field.

Click on any title in the detailed summary results to open and view a digital copy of the corresponding original publication.

### Ontario Records Online

An online database created by the Quinte Branch of the Ontario Genealogical Society has been updated and now comprises 1,014,600 names to help genealogists research ancestors in the Ontario counties of Hastings, Prince Edward and Northumberland. The names are drawn from hundreds of genealogies, family histories, ancestor charts, cemetery transcriptions, local newspaper indexes, directories, local histories, parish register transcripts, surrogate court wills and funeral cards. The database is available at www.rootsweb.ancestrv.com/~cangbogs Full details associated with index entries may be obtained from the Quinte Branch for a small research fee.

# News from the British Isles

#### 1911 U.K. Census Update

1911 U.K. census records have been released to the public in stages since January 2009. The process was completed recently, establishing access to records for all English and Welsh counties, the Channel Islands, Isle of Man, Royal Navy ships (at sea at the time of census) and overseas military establishments.

Due to statutory requirements, personally sensitive information in the 1911 U.K. census will be withheld until January 3, 2012. "Personally sensitive" information includes:

- Details of infirmity and other healthrelated information
- Information about family relationships that would have been kept secret

 Details of children born to women in prison, who were aged three or under at the time of the census

Released 1911 census data is available online at www.1911census.co.uk. Searching is free but viewing of household transcripts and original documents is subject to a fee. Several pay-as-you-go and subscription options are available.



Regarding the rest of the British Isles, the release of 1911 Scottish census records is subject to separate legislation. The records are scheduled for release just after March 27, 2011 when a statutory 100-year embargo ends. 1911 Irish census records are already available to the public (see next item).

### Irish Census, 1911 Project - Update

The 1901 and 1911 enumerations are the only surviving full censuses of Ireland. Both cover the whole island. The National Archives of Ireland is currently engaged in a project aimed at creating free online access to indexes and digital images of 1901 and 1911 Irish census records. Recently 1911 census records of several more counties were added to the database. Counties for which records are now available include:

- Antrim
- Cork
- Donegal
- Down
- Dublin
- Galway
- Kerry
- King's
- Wexford







Currently, household transcriptions only indicate the Surname, Forename, Age and Sex of each individual. In September, the site will be rebuilt to include full transcription of ALL data on 1911 household forms including details such as religion, occupation, relationship to head of family, literacy status, marital status, county or country of origin, Irish language proficiency, specified illnesses and child survival information. A 1901 census database, with all data transcribed, is scheduled for launch towards the end of 2009. www.census.nationalarchives.ie



### **British Newspapers 1800-1900**

Access to articles from 49 historical London, national and regional newspapers for the period from 1800-1900 is now available on the British Library website. Over two million pages can be searched by keyword to locate information on people, property, legal notices, advertisements and news. Preview results show selected keywords in context. Passes, allowing full views of digital newspaper items, can be purchased for 24 hours (£6.99 / maximum 100 article or page views) or 7-days (£9.99 / maximum 200 article/page views). http://newspapers.bl.uk

### **New Scottish Family History Magazine**

A new Scottish family history magazine is now available. **Discover My Past Scotland** is the only genealogy magazine to focus specifically on Scottish research. The monthly publication is only available online

(www.discovermypast.co.uk). Subscriptions may be purchased for 1, 3, 6 or 12 issues. A 12-issue subscription costs £25.00.



#### **New from ScotlandsPeople**

**ScotlandsPeople** is the official Scottish government source of genealogical data for Scotland. The fee-based site provides access to indexes and images from old parish registers, statutory (civil) registers and census records. Will and testament indexes and the coats-of-arms indexes may be searched for free although there is a charge to view documents.

#### 1881 Census Images Now Available

Images of 1881 Scottish census records are now available on the **ScotlandsPeople** website. (Previously, only a census transcription was available.) This completes access to indexes and images for all Scottish census records, 1841-1901 through **ScotlandsPeople**.

### Old Parish Records - Death and Burial Indexes and Images Now Available

Indexes and images of death and burial records from old parochial registers covering the period from 1538 to 1854 are now online. The site also provides access to Scottish births, baptisms, banns and marriages for the same period.

**ScotlandsPeople** has been expanded to include more modern Scottish birth, marriage and death records. The following are now available:

#### Scottish Coats-of-Arms Now Available

A searchable database of coats-of-arms has been added to **ScotlandsPeople**. The database provides access to digital images from the Public Register of All Arms and Bearings in Scotland from 1672 until 1907. Although older entries include less detail, later records may include a considerable amount of genealogical information.

# California Digital Newspaper Collection

A new collection of digital newspapers provides access to 200,000 pages of California newspapers published from 1849-1911. The California Digital Newspaper Collection currently includes 6 newspapers: Alta California (1849-1891), San Francisco Call (1893-1910), Amador Ledger (1900-1911), Imperial Valley Press (1901-1911), Sacramento Record-Union (1859-1890) and Los Angeles Herald (1905-1907). Searching and viewing is free.

Additional years are coming and the collection will be expanded to include other California newspapers.

# Getting Started... South Africa

South Africa is home to a population representing diverse indigenous and immigrant origins.

For genealogists with South African connections in their family tree, a good place to start is the www.ancestry24.co.za website. The home page includes a link to the useful Ancestry24 Beginner's Guide: 7 Steps to Researching Your Family with practical information and advice on genealogical research in the South African context. Free registration on www.ancestry24.co.za provides access to the rest of the site's open content including a Learning Centre with extensive information on South African records and annotated, comprehensive lists of Web Resources. For a fee, users can subscribe and search for ancestors in a large online collection of South African genealogical data.



Another important resource is the National Archives of South Africa, which maintains the online National Automated Archival Information Retrieval System (NAAIRS). NAAIRS can be used to identify documents of possible interest in archival collections in Pretoria, Cape Town, Port Elizabeth, Pietermaritzburg, Durban and Bloemfontein. NAAIRS also includes a large database of South African gravestone information. NAAIRS is available without charge at www.national.archives.gov.za.

The Genealogical Institute of South Africa (www.gisa.org.za) may also be useful when researching South African connections. The Institute's main focus is on the publication of genealogies and family histories. Its flagship publication project, the South African Genealogies series, recently published its 17th volume, completing coverage of South African surnames, A-Z. Listings of the surnames covered by each volume are available on the Institute's website. Purchase information is also available.

The Genealogical Society of South Africa (www.gensa.info) is another potentially useful resource for family historians researching South African roots. The Society has a variety of projects underway and publishes a quarterly journal, Familia. There are 11 branches in South African cities and regions.

The vast collection of microfilms at the Family History Library (FHL) in Salt Lake City, Utah includes South African records. These may be borrowed for \$6.00 per reel through the Vancouver Public Library's interlibrary loan department.
