

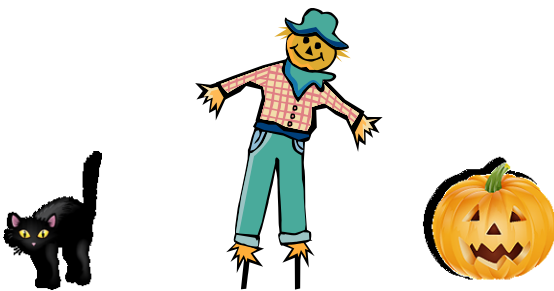

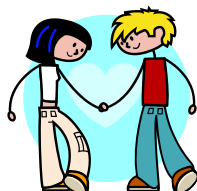

Digital Images of B.C. Birth Registrations Now Online!

At the beginning of September, FamilySearch's **Record Search Pilot** site launched a new database comprising B.C. birth registration records, 1854-1903. This represents all historical B.C. birth registrations currently released to the public.

While a free searchable online index to historical B.C. civil registration records has long been available on the B.C. Archives website (www.bcarchives.gov.bc.ca), the new **Record Search Pilot** database allows users to search by the names of both or either parents, a feature not previously available. Moreover, whereas full registration records – which contain much more information than provided in the indexes – were previously only available on microfilm at the Vancouver Public Library and a number of other repositories, **Record Search Pilot** provides – for the first time – free access to digital images of the records.

Similar databases for historical B.C. marriage and death registrations are currently being compiled.

New British Columbia 1901 Census Database

The B.C. Genealogical Society has launched an online database of B.C. 1901 federal census records. The database can be searched by **Surname**, **Given Name** and **Birth Year**. Results indicate **Surname**, **Name** (given), **Sex**, **Colour**, **Relate** (relationship to head of household), **Marital** status, **BDate**, **Age**, **BPlace**, **Race**, **Nationality**, **Religion** and **Occupation**.

While 1901 B.C. federal census records are available in other databases, the quality and structure of databases varies, making this a useful alternative source to check for B.C. ancestors.

1916 Census Records

The microfilm version of the **1916 Census of the Prairie Provinces** is now available in Fine Arts and History on Level 6 at the Central Library. These records cover Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

New Ontario Vital Events

The latest release of microfilm indexes to Ontario birth, marriage and death records is now available at the Vancouver Public Library. These indexes cover the following vital events:

- Births, 1912
- Marriages, 1927
- Deaths, 1937

References located using the indexes provide essential information which can be used to order microfilm copies of full original registration records from the Archives of Ontario through interlibrary loan.

While indexes and digital images of most Ontario birth, marriage and death records since 1869 are now available through **Ancestry Library Edition**, records for 1910-1912 births, 1925-1927 marriages and 1935-1937 deaths are available exclusively on microfilm.

Drouin Collection Arbitration

In 2007, Ancestry launched a digital version of the Drouin Collection, comprising millions of records from microfilmed registers of Catholic, Protestant and Jewish congregations in Quebec. In 2008, a nominal index was added, greatly improving access to the collection. Now the future of Ancestry's Drouin Collection database is in question. The custodians of the original microfilms, the Institut généalogique Drouin have taken Ancestry to arbitration, citing lack of full and proper indexing of the Drouin Collection as placed online by Ancestry.

In early August, the arbitrating judge sided with Drouin and declared that Ancestry had failed to meet its contractual obligations. Ancestry has 60 days to remedy the situation and will lose its license from the Institut Drouin should it fail to do so.

For now, the Drouin Collection has been taken offline and is not available to Ancestry users.



World War Two POW Records

In late August, Ancestry launched a new online collection of World War II prisoner-of-war information. **UK, British Army Prisoners of War, 1939-1945** comprises over 100,000 records of World War II British and Commonwealth POWs. The records are associated with personnel imprisoned between 1939 and 1945 in Germany, Austria and Poland and were compiled by German military authorities according to the 1929 Geneva Convention, which requires opposing forces to notify each other of captured combatants. The records include many Canadians.

The database can be searched by **First Name, Last Name, Regiment, Camp Location** and **Keyword(s)**. Individual results include **Name, Rank, Army Number, Regiment, POW Number, Camp Type, Camp Number, Camp Location, Record Office** and **Record Office Number**.

There are no digital images associated with the index.

Jewish Family History Records

Ancestry has expanded its collection of online Jewish family history records. The addition of these new records has been made possible through collaboration with the **American Jewish Historical Society** and the **Routes to Roots Foundation**. The American Jewish Historical Society maintains records that document the American Jewish community in the Americas from the 16th century to the present while Routes to Roots specializes in Jewish research in Eastern European archives.

Caribbean Slave Records

In mid-July, Ancestry launched a significant online database collection derived from Caribbean slave records encompassing nearly two hundred years of St. Croix-Virgin Islands history. The database is a product of the **St. Croix African Roots Project**, initiated by Virgin Islands History Associates in 2002 to consolidate records that document the population, families and individuals on St. Croix during the period of Danish rule. The database reflects historical records found in American, Danish and Virgin Islands archives.

The first database in the collection – now available online – is **U.S. Virgin Islands, St. Croix Slave Plantation and Head Tax Lists, 1772-1821**. The database is comprised of digital images and is not indexed. Future documents to be scanned and added will include:

Hidden Gems

Alberta, Formerly the Northwest Territories: Index to Registration of Births, Marriages and Deaths, 1870 to 1905, Volume I (1995)

The book is a key to two separate collections released by Alberta Vital Statistics in 1989 and held by the Provincial Archives of Alberta (PAA). The first collection, Accession 89.90, comprises birth registrations from 1870 to 1890 (as well as a single 1857 record). Because civil registration was not introduced in the Northwest Territories until 1889, many of the records are delayed registrations. The second collection, Accession 89.440 includes birth registrations from 1898 to 1904 and marriage and death registrations from 1898 to 1905. Entries include **Surname, Given Names**, names of **Parents OR Spouse** (if applicable), **Sex, Event Type** (birth, marriage or death) and **Date, Place** and **Bx-File-Reg**. The latter is a file reference that can be used obtain full birth, marriage or death registration details from the PAA.

Despite its similar title and scope, this work is complementary to the previous title and does

not provide duplicate information. The book is a key to information in records associated with the first system of civil registration introduced in the Northwest Territories in 1889. Initially, five divisional registrars maintained records but the system expanded until 1897 when a new central registry and second registration system were introduced. The records of the first system were deposited in the Provincial Archives of Alberta although the collection is not complete (for example Calgary marriage records are missing). The information found in this book corresponds to Provincial Archives of Alberta Accessions 89.451 and 93.203. Each entry includes the individual's **Name, Associated Name** (if applicable), **Event & Date, Place Registered** and **Reference**. Again, the latter can be used to obtain the full birth, marriage or death registration record from the PAA.

Canadian Naturalization Records

A new version of the Canadian Genealogy Centre's **Canadian Naturalization 1915-1932** database has been released with the names of 206,731 individuals who applied for and were granted status as naturalized Canadians. References from the database can be used to request copies of actual naturalization records, which are held by Citizenship and Immigration Canada.

The database draws on all naturalization lists published in the Canada Gazette between 1915-1932. The Canada Gazette is a weekly government publication reporting on activities of the Government of Canada. Database entries are linked to digital images of Gazette pages. Details associated with each individual and published in the Canada Gazette typically include:

- Name
- Country of origin or for a wife/child, the relationship to the person being naturalized
- Date that the certificate was issued, or the date that the oath of allegiance was taken
- Occupation
- Residence
- Certificate number and series

While everyone born in the United Kingdom or another Commonwealth country was a British subject and retained that status if they immigrated to Canada, the database is a valuable source of information for genealogists with roots outside the Commonwealth whose ancestors had to apply to become naturalized British subjects.

News from Family Search

Swedish Church Records Project

FamilySearch and **Svensk Arkivinformation**, a division of the National Archives of Sweden, have announced the launch of the largest online indexing initiative undertaken by FamilySearch to date. The project will engage Swedish volunteers throughout the world to help create a searchable, free online index to historic parish registers of Sweden, encompassing over 400 million names in records spanning a period of 200 years. The project will begin with records from Örebro, Uppsala, and Södermanland counties.

The digital images and indexes will eventually form part of FamilySearch's **Record Search Pilot** suite of databases.

News from Ontario

Wellington County

The **Wellington County Museum & Archives Virtual History Book Project** was undertaken in 2004 in celebration of Wellington County's 150th anniversary. The project has digitized a collection known as the Tweedsmuir Histories. The Tweedsmuir Histories reflect the efforts of the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario, which in the 1920s established a committee for Historical Research and Current Events that encouraged Women's Institutes to compile scrapbooks to record the history of their local community. This laid the groundwork for the Wellington County Tweedsmuir History books collection.

Early Families Project of North Bay, Ontario

In 2006, the University of Nipissing in North Bay, Ontario began to collect the histories of the area's First Families. The oral histories of five families – those of William Milne, Patrick M. Bourke, John William Deegan, John W. Richardson and Robert Rankin – are now available online, reflecting the work of students in collaboration with genealogists from the Nipissing Branch of the Ontario Genealogical Society.

The initial collection to be digitized will be the Capron collection, a set of documents associated with Hiram "King" Capron, founder of the settlement of Paris in Brant County.



Canadian Genealogy & Historical Links are Back

A popular Canadian genealogy and history portal is back after being offline for several years. **Canadian Genealogy & Historical Links** points to almost 1800 databases and now includes a blog. The site has also been re-organized to make the links more accessible. In addition to **National** links, there are separate sections for each province as well as additional categories for **Acadian**, **Archives**, **Census**, **Cemeteries**, **Loyalist**, **Military** and other links. The portal also includes a listing of Personal Pages, as well as a search function and New Listings area.

Canadian Headstone Photo Project

A new project has been launched with the goal of providing online access to headstone information from every Canadian province as well as the U.S.A. and Ireland.

Each entry in the database includes a picture of the headstone, a transcription and the date that the information was submitted to the database. Notes provide additional information that may be very helpful to genealogists.

Only a limited amount of Canadian material is currently available on the site and volunteers are being sought to participate in the project.

B.C. cemeteries represented and the number of photos / transcriptions added so far include:

Canada's National Cemetery Announced

Beechwood Cemetery has been declared Canada's first National Cemetery and a National Historic Site. The cemetery, Ottawa's largest, was started in 1873 and also houses the RCMP Memorial Cemetery, the National Military Cemetery of the Canadian Forces and numerous soldiers from the Northwest Rebellion of 1885.

The cemetery is planning a reference centre to assist visitors and families researching their roots. Meanwhile, individuals wishing assistance in tracing their family tree can call for an appointment (if extensive research is required, a fee may apply).

Irish Census Update

1911 census records for all Irish counties are now available on the National Archives of Ireland's free **Census of Ireland 1911** website. With this expansion, the database covers the entire island of Ireland.

The site will be re-developed this fall to include transcription of all data in each household census form, adding information on religion, occupation, relationship to head-of-household, literacy status, marital status, county or country of origin, Irish language proficiency, specified illnesses and child survival.

Records of the 1901 census of Ireland, with full transcription, will be launched in late 2009 – early 2010.

Researching military families can be challenging because of the peripatetic nature of their lifestyles. To use the example of the census – a key source for most genealogists – it can be difficult to know where a family might have been because they were often on the move. At the same time, this flux and change means that the lives of such families were colourful and interesting.

A great deal of military material is now available online but this information often doesn't tell the story of what it was like to grow up in these circumstances. Thus, in late 2007, **The Army Children Archive** was set up to chronicle the lives of military children from the 17th century to the present day. The site has attracted interest from a broad spectrum of family, social, military and educational historians as well as former and current army

children and their families, a number of whom have contributed personal information, stories, memories, photographs and reflections. Sections include **Lives & Times** (personal stories), **On the Move, Postings, Accommodation, Healthcare & Hospitals, Schooling, Memories & Miscellanea, Famous Army Children** and more. The **History Matters** section provides a guide to researching military family history not only in the United Kingdom, but also in India, Jamaica, Malta and other locations.



New York Birth Records 1901-1907 Index Now Online

A free online index to New York City births 1901-1907 is now available through the efforts of the German Genealogy Group and Italian Genealogical Group, both of which are international organizations with a strong base in the New York metropolitan area.

The database, available through either of the URLs above, is not limited to those of Italian or German origin and provides the Family Name, Given Name, Month of Birth, Day of Birth, Year of Birth, Certificate Number, County, and Soundex associated with each individual. Images of the original records associated with the database are available on microfilm at the New York City Municipal Archives or the Family History Library in Salt Lake City.

Searches may be done by Last Name, First Name or Initial, and Certificate Number and limited by date and / or county (Kings, Queens, Bronx, Manhattan or Richmond).

Spotlight on...
Canadian Parliamentary
Divorces



Prior to 1968 divorces in Canada were granted only by private acts of the Government of Canada. Although there are records of these private acts back to 1840, just five divorces were granted by the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Canada prior to Confederation in 1867.

Canada Gazette Notices

Between 1867 and 1968, a person who wished to obtain a divorce was required to place a notice of intent to petition the government for an Act of Divorce in the Canada Gazette, Part I and in two newspapers in the district or county where the petitioner resided. The notice had to appear for a six-month period.

Divorce notices were published weekly in the Canada Gazette, Part I, which is available at the Vancouver Public Library (Ref. 328.7 C211).

To search for a divorce notice in the Gazette, first request the relevant annual index at the information desk on Level 6. When you receive the index, look under **ADVERTISEMENTS - APPLICATIONS TO PARLIAMENT**. Divorce notices are listed with corresponding page numbers, e.g.
Banfield, Eric 3438

Once the index has confirmed that a divorce notice was published during the corresponding year, you can request the annual volume(s) of the Gazette (Ref. 328.7 C211) and look up the notice on the page cited.

Acts of Divorce

Petitions to the government for Acts of Divorce included details such as the date and place of the marriage and events which had caused it to founder. In cases of adultery or bigamy, a co-respondent was often named. If the petition was eventually allowed, Parliament would pass an Act of Divorce nullifying the marriage. Between 1867 and 1963, a transcript of the Act was published in the annual Statutes of Canada. Between 1964 and 1968, details were published in the Journals of the Senate of Canada.

Information from the transcripts published in the annual Statutes of Canada and later in the Journals of the Senate of Canada has been compiled into a database under the title **Divorce in Canada (1841-1968)**. The database is available free of charge on the Canadian Genealogy Centre website (www.genealogy.gc.ca). It also includes details of the five divorces granted prior to Confederation and published in the Statutes of the Province of Canada and Journals of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Canada.

Each divorce listed in the database includes Name of Petitioner and Name of Spouse as well as a Source, Reference and Citation to one of four sources.

In most cases, the source is available at the Vancouver Public Library. Usually, it is the annual volumes of the Statutes of Canada in which the divorce acts was published. To locate the act, ask for the relevant annual volume(s), of the Acts of the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada. (Ref. 345.7 C21a) at the information desk on Level 6 at the Central Library. When you receive the annual volume(s) the Citation will be the number of a specific chapter (act) within the volume. For example, Reference 1889, Citation 110 refers to Chap.110 in the annual statutes for 1889. The same process can be used to locate divorce acts published in the earlier Statutes of the Province of Canada.



If the source was the Journals of the Senate of Canada, these can be consulted at the Vancouver Public Library, although the information published in the Journals is much briefer than what appears in the Statutes. To locate divorce records in the Journals of the Senate, ask for the relevant annual volume of the Journals of the Senate of Canada (Ref. 328.7 C21js) at the information desk on Level 6 at the Central Library. When you receive the annual volume, look at the table of contents at the front to locate the index to “Annulments and Dissolutions of Marriages.” Search the index to find the person in whom you are interested (in the case of women, look for both the maiden and married surname). The following is an example of a reference from the 1964-1965 Journals of the Senate:

Walker, Murray Hutchison

- **Petition, 636; – reported, 644; adopted, 659.**
- **Resolution 521; – presented, 659; adopted, 665**

In the above example, 636 and 521 are numbers assigned to the Petition and Resolution. The remaining numbers represent the page numbers in the Journal on which the information relevant to the divorce appears.

If the source is the Journals of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Canada, these are not available at the Vancouver Public Library but can be consulted at the University of British Columbia and Simon Fraser University. Divorce acts listed in the Journals or in the other three sources cited above can also be ordered from Library and Archives Canada.



Additional Information

Hugh Armstrong’s Genealogy Site includes a section on **Canadian Parliamentary Divorces, 1926-1946** with a detailed overview of the history of divorce in Canada (see the **Introduction**). The site also has an **Index**, mainly based on the Canada Gazette and Statutes of Canada but it is only a nominal listing, with no further references or information.

Google for Genealogists - 1: Search Engine Tips

Google (www.google.com) is the Internet's most popular search engine. Although it doesn't focus specifically on genealogy or family history, Google's mission "**to organize the world's information and make it universally available and useful**" means that it has a great deal to offer the many genealogists in its global audience.

The most basic use of Google is to enter and execute a search strategy using the input box on the Google home page. When creating a search strategy, very slight changes in how it is structured can dramatically affect your results. For example, a search for **Thomas Lockerby genealogy** finds 117,000 matches, while **+Thomas +Lockerby +genealogy** narrows results to 7740 and "**Thomas * Lockerby**" genealogy finds just 3 matches.

So how can you search Google more efficiently to find the most genealogically useful links? Understanding Google commands and operators is a good first step.

Google Commands and Operators

QUOTATION MARKS (" ")

Quotation marks retrieve results in which **exactly the same string of characters** occurs as appears inside your quotation marks and in **exactly the same order and proximity**. The following are examples of how quotation marks can be used in a Google search to narrow results:

"Archibald Wilson"

"Wilson, Archibald"

"Archibald Wilson" Ontario

"Archibald Wilson" AND "Mary Featherstone"

WILDCARD (*)

The wildcard operator directs Google to find results that include any character or string of characters that occur in place of the asterisk. Thus, a search for "**Archibald * Wilson**" will pull in pages on which the following character strings occur:

Archibald Duncan Wilson

Archibald D. Wilson

Archibald Wilson

OR (|)

The OR operator locates **any** record in which words in the query appear. This may be useful if a name has frequent variants, for example:

Lindon OR Linden OR Lyndon OR Lynden

The pipe symbol (|) may be used instead of OR.

NOT (-)

This is a negative operator which directs Google to exclude any results which contain the specified word or phrase. The negative operator is a **single hyphen**. No space should appear between the negative operator and the search term. The negative operator is useful if you are searching names that have other common meanings or associations, e.g.

Halifax -nova -scotia

Trudeau family -pierre -elliott -prime -minister

PLUS (+)

The plus-operator instructs Google not to stem search terms. Stemming occurs when Google locates not only the exact word entered but also related words. For example, if the search word is **die**, Google stemming also finds web pages in which the word **dies** or **died** appears. If you use the plus-operator, this does not happen. For example, a search for "**Archibald Wilson**" **+bakery** will not pull in pages on which the word **baker** or **bake** appears.

TILDE (~)

The tilde sign is used to locate synonyms for a specific key word. For example, the query below will retrieve web pages on which the word **genealogy** appears as well as pages on which the phrase **family history** is seen.

“Archibald Wilson” ~genealogy



Top Tip

While the operators described above may be combined with search terms in almost limitless ways, genealogists should at a minimum always use the search strategy demonstrated in the example below when searching for an ancestor in Google:

“Archibald Wilson” OR “Wilson, Archibald” OR “Archibald * Wilson”
