Newsletter Schedule Changes

As of 2010, the Vancouver Public Library Genealogical Resources Newsletter will be moving from a quarterly to a semi-annual schedule. Two issues will be published per year, in March and September. The newsletter will continue to list all new genealogy books and other resources received for the Vancouver Public Library collection and provide information about upcoming genealogy programs at the Vancouver Public Library and elsewhere.

Due to the reduced frequency of the newsletter, a regular email notification system regarding upcoming genealogy programs at the Central Library will be established. Family History Library Microfilm Loan Period Reduced

Many Vancouver Public Library genealogy patrons borrow microfilms from the Family History Library in Salt Lake City through Vancouver Public Library Interlibrary Loans. All such patrons should note that effective immediately, the loan period for Family History Library microfilms has been reduced to 21 days. This change brings the borrowing period into line with the regular Vancouver Public Library loan period. Family History Library microfilm users will continue to have access to microfilms any time during library hours, 7 days per week.

Ancestors Magazine

This magazine, published six times a year by The National Archives in the United Kingdom, offers recent news, informative articles and expert advice with a focus on England and Wales.

Family Chronicle

Hidden Gems



A Dictionary of Scottish Emigrants to Canada Before Confederation, 4 vol. Whyte, by Donald Whyte, 1986-2005 Ref. 929.371 W62d

The results of over 40 years of research are compiled in this massive work, which contains details of thousands of individuals who emigrated from Scotland to Canada from around the time of the U.S. Revolutionary War until 1867. The data has been culled from a wide variety of primary and secondary sources as well as correspondence with descendants of Scottish emigrants.

The amount of information in individual entries varies but may include approximate birth and death dates, parents' names, date of emigration, destination in Canada, names of spouse and children and other details. Each entry includes a bibliographic reference to the source.

When using the series to research Scottish emigrant ancestors, it is necessary to check all four volumes, as each book contains many new entries as well as appendices with information about emigrants listed in previous volumes.

Ancestry Library Edition is a popular online collection of records available to Vancouver Public Library users at all locations.

Canada, Ocean Arrivals (Form 30A), 1919-1924

A significant new addition to Ancestry's collection of Canadian immigration records is the new Canada, Ocean Arrivals (Form 30A), 1919-1924 database. The database provides records of almost 753,000 people who arrived at Canadian ports between 1919 and 1924, a period during which the names of passengers were not listed on ship manifests (passenger lists) but on individual pre-printed forms. Not all offices started using Form 30A at the same time. Some began as early as 1919, others as late as 1922. Form 30A was discontinued after

1924 and use of the former ship manifests resumed.

Although Form 30A changed slightly over time, information recorded generally included:

- Ship
- · Port of departure
- Arrival date
- Port of arrival
- Name of passenger
- Age
- Gender
- Birthplace
- Marital status
- Present occupation
- Intended occupation
- Race
- Citizenship
- Religion
- Object in going to Canada
- Whether intend to live permanently in Canada
- Destination
- Name of the nearest relative in country from which they came
- Passport information

The new database is searchable by name, date and port of arrival, date and port of departure, birthplace and year, ship name, gender and keyword. Results are linked to digital images of original records.

Ontario, Canada, Marriage Registers by Clergy, 1896-1948

This new Ancestry database is derived from 18 volumes of marriage registers created by clergy under the Registration Act of 1896. It includes records of 12,000 marriages, mainly Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian.

The Registration Act of 1896 required clergymen to report marriages within 30 days

of when they occurred. Previous laws had mandated a reporting period of 90 days. The registers were compiled using pre-printed forms, with space for recording name, age, residence, whether bachelor, spinster, widower or widow, groom's occupation, religious denomination and names of parents.

The database is searchable and results are linked to digital copies of original records.

Drouin Collection Back Online

The last issue of this newsletter reported that the Drouin Collection, which comprises millions of records from microfilmed registers of Catholic, Protestant and Jewish congregations in Quebec, had been removed from Ancestry. Following an arbitration against Ancestry and in favour of the Institut généalogique Drouin, custodians of the original microfilms. The arbitrator declared that Ancestry had failed to meet its contractual obligations to the Institut généalogique Drouin. Ancestry was given 60 days to remedy the situation and the Drouin Collection was taken offline. Luckily for researchers with Quebec roots, it would appear that Ancestry has resolved the problems as the collection is once again available.

<u>London Parish Registers Databases</u> <u>Launched</u>

For genealogists with ancestral connections to London, England, Ancestry now provides access to 14 million indexed and digital images of records from London parish registers. There are four databases:

- London, England, Baptisms, Marriages and Burials, 1538-1812
- London, England, Marriages and Banns, 1754-1921
- London, England, Births and Baptisms, 1813-1906
- London, England, Deaths and Burials, 1813-1980

Most of the records can be searched by name, date, locality and event, although the registers can only be browsed in the case of baptisms, births, deaths and burials prior to 1813 and marriages prior to 1754,

Ancestry secured exclusive rights to digitize and host these and other key records from the London Metropolitan Archives and Guildhall Library Manuscripts collections in 2008.

<u>Gretna Green, Scotland, Marriage</u> <u>Registers, 1794-1895</u>

A mile inside the Scottish border, Gretna Green has become famous as "Britain's marriage capital." Thousands of couples eloped to the Scottish border town for clandestine marriages after Lord Hardwicke's Marriage Act of 1753 required parental permission for all couples marrying under the age of 21, a law which didn't exist in Scotland. Records of more than 10,000 Gretna Green marriages, including details of over 21,000 people, are now available in the new Ancestry database. The records are derived from what is known as the Lang Collection of Gretna Green Marriage Registers, which document about half of the marriages performed from 1794-1895.

The database is searchable and results are linked to digital copies of original records.

Enhanced U.S. Census Collection

In response to customer feedback, Ancestry has improved images associated with many of its U.S. federal census. This was a priority Ancestry project during 2009. Enhanced and clearer images have now been provided for the 1790-1900 censuses, while the 1850, 1860, 1870 and 1900 censuses have been upgraded. More than 200 million records were reviewed. For those who have previously used Ancestry unsuccessfully to review the U.S. federal

census, now might be a good time to go back for another look.

Reports of Deaths of American Citizens Abroad, 1960, 1963-1974

Another new Ancestry data collection, Reports of Deaths of American Citizens Abroad, 1960, 1963-1974 comprises more than 80,000 records verifying the deaths of Americans overseas. Documents include letters, formal reports, passports and other historical documents. The database is searchable by name, country and year of death, birth year and keyword and results are linked to digital images of original documents.



<u>Honolulu, Hawaii, Passenger Lists,</u> 1900-1953

Although most genealogists may not have ancestors who lived in the 50th U.S. state, Ancestry's new **Honolulu**, **Hawaii**, **Passenger Lists**, **1900-1953** database may have records of ancestors who vacationed or stopped there while emigrating to or from North America. The database comprises over 1.4 million records of passenger arrivals in Honolulu and is searchable by name, birthplace, birth year, ethnicity, gender, port of arrival, arrival year, port of departure, departure year, ship name and keyword. Results are linked to digital images of original records.

<u>Bavaria, Germany, WWI Personnel Rosters,</u> 1914-1918

Ancestry has also recently added a comprehensive collection of German service records from World War I.

In 1871, four kingdoms – Bavaria, Prussia, Saxony and Wurttemberg – united to create a unitary German state but each retained its own military until the end of World War I. The new Ancestry database lists soldiers from the Bavarian Regiment, providing details of the military careers of 1.5 million Bavarian soldiers.

Each record includes the soldier's name, rank, date and place of birth, details of their active service, religion, status or occupation, marital status, parents' names and address. The database is searchable and results include digital images of original records, which are held by The Bavarian State Archives.

Corrections

Vancouver Public Library occasionally receives queries from genealogists who have noticed transcription errors in online Ancestry Library Edition records. While subscribers to the home version (variously known as **Ancestry.ca**, **Ancestry.com** etc.) can submit corrections online, the Ancestry Library Edition version includes no such facility.

The Vancouver Public Library has been advised, however, that corrections can be emailed to **libraryedition@ancestry.com**

News from Family Search

Toronto Trust Cemeteries Project

A collaborative project between the **Toronto Branch of the Ontario Genealogical Society**and **FamilySearch.org** will create an online index to the burial registers of the Toronto
Trust Cemeteries, previously known as the **Pleasant Group of Cemeteries**. The initial phase of the project will cover records up to 1930, including:

- York General Burying Ground (Potter's Field) 1826-1865
- Toronto Necropolis 1850-1930
- Mount Pleasant Cemetery 1876-1930
- Prospect Cemetery 1890-1930

The new index will be included on the FamilySearch **Record Search** site (see below).



FamilySearch Wiki

wiki.familysearch.org

A wiki is a dynamic online library of articles. A key feature is the ability for anyone to easily revise and add new material. The best-known example is the Wikipedia, but for genealogists, FamilySearch now has its own wiki. Rather than providing records of ancestors, FamilySearch Wiki provides detailed information about researching family history. Content ranges from general "get-started" guidance to articles on specialized topics.

It is not necessary to register in order to read articles in **FamilySearch Wiki** but anyone who successfully completes the free, easy registration process can become a FamilySearch wiki editor and contribute articles or revise existing ones.

News from the Canadian Genealogy Centre

The Canadian Genealogy Centre recently made improvements to a number of pages on its website, in most cases fixing typos and broken links and changing wording.

In addition, contact information for armed forces in other countries was added to the First World War and Canadian Forces After 1918 (including Second World War) pages.

Finally, the guide Researching Your
Aboriginal Ancestry at Library and Archives
Canada was fully revised and published online

Canadian Almanac and Directory Online

Digital copies of the historical <u>Canadian</u> <u>Almanac and Directory</u> are available in the Internet Archives and can easily be browsed through a user-friendly interface. The digital collection includes an online version of annual editions of the almanac for most years from 1848-1912.

The almanacs provide a wealth of information about the world of our ancestors, include many details that may be helpful when conducting specialized research – for example, lists of cities, towns and villages, churches, post offices, railroad stations, etc. Many lists of personal names are included, especially members of professions (lawyers, surveyors, clergy), executive members of associations, members of masonic lodges, etc.

The Memory Project: Stories of the Second World War

The Memory Project is a new nation-wide endeavour, aimed at creating a record of Canada's participation in the Second World War as seen through the eyes of veterans. B.C Archives -Commemorative Birth Certificates Available

In December 2009 the B.C. Vital Statistics Agency introduced a new commemorative birth certificate collection. The certificates are available in 42 styles, including Classic, Background Colours (5 selections) and Stylized Scenes of British Columbia (36 selections). The "Stylized Scenes" are taken from a mural called "Splendid Diversity – 36 More Wonders of the World" by Carol Christianson, commissioned by the Royal B.C. Museum as part of an exhibition celebrating B.C.'s 150th birthday. Commemorative birth certificates can be combined into sets to create decorative scenes and are suitable for framing.

The certificates are issued by the B.C. Vital Statistics Agency and include the child's full name, date and time of birth, birth weight,

place of birth and sex. They are not intended for use as official identification.

Eligible applicants for a Commemorative Birth Certificate include:

- The person named in the birth event
- The mother of the person named in the birth event
- The father of the person named in the birth event (if named on the birth registration)
- The person with custody of the person named in the birth event (proof of court recognized legal custody must be provided)
- A person on the written consent of the individuals listed above.

Commemorative birth certificates are issued for the standard genealogy certificate price of \$50.00 each.

This new book explores the stories of Vancouver's immigrant communities from the 1870s to the present. Archival documents, old photographs and text tell the stories of the Americans, Scottish, Chinese, French, Italians, Welsh, Japanese, Danish, East Indians, English, Irish, Germans, Eastern Europeans, Swede-Finns, Dutch, Greeks, Portuguese, Filipinos and Vietnamese who settled in Vancouver. For those with origins in any of the above communities, the book offers useful clues and interesting insights into the experience of ancestors who settled in the city. The names of many individuals and families are included.



Making the News: A Times Colonist Look at 150 Years of History

To celebrate the 150th anniversary of the 1858 launching of *The British Colonist* in Victoria, its successor the *Victoria Times Colonist* has published a collection of stories selected from the news of every decade until 2008. The author and compiler, noted local and family historian Dave Obee, introduces each decennial set of stories with an historical overview. The narrative is lavishly illustrated with historical photographs and a running timeline. Profiles of the movers-and-shakers of each decade are also provided. This outstanding book will be of particular interest to all genealogists with Victoria roots -- or anyone with an interest in the history of the province.

Best of BC Books Online

As well as the above books, Vancouver Public Library patrons have access to **Best of BC Books Online**, an elibrary collection of about 1000 books published in British Columbia. Titles include pioneer stories, local histories and other materials of possible interest to genealogists with B.C. roots. The collection has been created by The Friends of the Loyalist Collection at Brock University, whose mandate is to create a library of original United Empire Loyalist documents on microfilm.

Ottawa Citizen Archives Googlized

Google has added digital archives of the Ottawa Citizen to its News Archives Search website. The online Ottawa Citizen Archives provides coverage back to 1890, with access to about 2.5 million articles, although there are some unexplained time gaps.

While some publications indexed in Google **News Archives Search** are only available on a pay-per-view basis, access to the <u>Ottawa Citizen</u> material is free. With this new resource, it is much easier to locate useful genealogical information in newspaper announcements (birth notices, obituaries, etc.)

To access Google's Ottawa Citizen archives:

- When the Advanced News Archive Search screen opens, enter ottawa citizen in the Source field.
- Enter search terms in other fields and execute the search.

Tweedsmuir Histories to be Placed Online

The Tweedsmuir Histories reflect the efforts of the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario, which in the 1920s established a committee for Historical Research and Current Events. The committee encouraged Women's Institutes to compile scrapbooks to record the history of their local communities. Of 1500 Women's Institute branches, 989 created local histories for their area. For some tiny communities, the Tweedsmuir History is the only history that has been created. Many are now very fragile.

As reported in the previous issue (#28), the Wellington County Museum & Archives Virtual History Book Project recently digitized the Wellington County Tweedsmuir Histories and made them available on the Internet. In the near future, many more will become available, following the announcement in November 2009 of a partnership between the Ontario Genealogical Society and the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario to digitize the histories and add them to the Ontario Genealogical Society elibrary. The Tweedsmuir Histories will then be available for borrowing and reading for a small fee. The project is expected to take at least three years.

Early New Brunswick Historical Documents Online

A \$120,000 federal grant has made it possible for the New Brunswick Provincial Archives website to add 65,000 more provincial government documents to its website. The new documents include records of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick from 1786 to 1833 as well as photo galleries of early New Brunswick, individual portraits and maps.

Newfoundland Genealogical Toolkit Gets Funding Boost

A major project entitled the **Newfoundland Genealogical Toolkit** has been granted \$1.8 million by the Canadian Government's **Atlantic Innovation Fund**. The funds will be used by the **Population Therapeutics Research Group (PTRG)** at Memorial University of Newfoundland to create a state-of-the-art information technology platform capable of generating large sample groups (family trees) to support research on the identification of genes associated with common diseases and undesirable drug reactions.

The project's focus on Newfoundland is due to the fact that the population of Newfoundland and Labrador is largely descended from Irish and English immigrants and is relatively homogeneous. This "founder population" is internationally recognized as an ideal resource for genetic studies. Findings from studies can often be generalized to the Canadian and worldwide populations.

DoVE Scheme Revived

Project DoVE is a scheme to index and digitize approximately 260 million English and Welsh civil registration records from 1837 forward. The project began in 2005 but faltered after the original contractor Siemens pulled out with only half of the records indexed. DoVE has now been revived by the British Home Office/Identity and Passport Service but a clear timetable for the completion of indexing and creation of the new online service has not been set.

The Devon Wills Project

A consolidated online index to Devon (England) wills, administrations and inventories is being created through the collaborative efforts of the Devon Family History Society, the Devon Record Office, GENUKI/Devon, and the Plymouth and West Devon Record Office. The index being created by **The Devon Wills Project** covers original documents, probate copies, transcripts and abstracts to 1857. Documents are included if the testator was associated with Devon, even if the will was proved elsewhere. Source notes provide detailed information about where to find original documents.

Welsh Wills Online

The National Library of Wales has placed digital copies of 190,000 wills on its website and made them available to the public for free. The wills were proved in the Welsh ecclesiastical courts and date from the 14th century to 1858, when civil probate was introduced. About 1000 are written in Welsh.

The database can be searched by Name, Parish, Township and Occupation.

Although digital images of the wills can be viewed online, printed copies must be ordered from the National Library of Wales using their online enquiry form.

News from the Irish Family History Foundation

The Irish Family History Foundation (IFHF) coordinates a network of local genealogy centres covering the whole of Ireland. Individual county centres offer a variety of resources and services. The Foundation's site, rootsireland.ie, is part of its Irish Genealogical Online Record Search System (ORS). The ORS comprises almost 40 million records computerized by the county centres, mainly church records of births (baptisms), marriages and deaths (burials). It can be searched for free although a fee is charged for viewing detailed results.

In January, the IFHF announced that member centres had made additional records available through the ORS. The new records are associated with six counties – **Antrim**, **Armagh**, **Down**, **Leitrim**, **Mayo** and **Cork**.

Records of Counties Laois, Offaly and Wexford are expected to be available on http://rootsireland.ie in 2010.

Registry of Deeds Index Project

Irish roots-seekers should also take note of the ongoing **Registry of Deeds Index Project** hosted by RootsWeb. The Registry of Deeds itself is located in Dublin and holds records of wills, land transactions and other deeds from 1709 forward. Most records are related to Protestants although Catholics are sometimes mentioned. The Registry is a rich source of genealogical information.

The Registry of Deeds Index Project covers records from 1709 to 1800. As of February 21, 2010, volunteers had created 46,285 index records from 6302 memorials of deeds. The index can be searched for free at the project website:

Copies of memorial documents can be ordered from the Registry of Deeds at a cost of €20.00.

Ancestors in British India

The Families in British India Society is an excellent resource for genealogists with European or Anglo-Indian ancestors who lived or worked in India or South Asia between 1600 and 1947.

Perhaps the most outstanding feature of the FIBIS website (www.fibis.org/index.html) is FIBIS Search, a database created through the efforts of volunteers. Records in FIBIS Search are mainly derived from almost 700 collections of documents in the British Library's collection of India Office Records. They include bonds, cemetery records, directories, ecclesiastical records, maps, military records, personal papers, photographs, publications, maritime records. Access to FIBIS Search is free.

Continental European Research - Article Series

Searching for records of Continental European ancestors is challenging due to factors such as language issues, name changes and shifting national boundaries. In many cases, there is a lack of accessible up-to-date English language "how-to" genealogy guides for specific European countries.

Some genealogists with Continental roots may find a series of articles published in the U.K.-based *Family Tree Magazine* useful. Over the past year or so, *FTM* has featured a different continental country in each issue, with short but informative overviews and tips.

Hot Tip - U.S. Records

A little-known program offered by the **U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services**(USCIS) provides access to information that is otherwise difficult or impossible to obtain.

Records include citizenship tests, naturalization files and visa applications. Files often provide details of exact hometowns in countries of origin and information on brothers, sisters, aunts and uncles. Information about applications for citizenship may also be available. If an ancestor of Japanese, German or Italian origin lived in the U.S. during World War II, there are often FBI reports concerning a person's family, friends and political activities.

The **USCIS Genealogy Program** started in 2008. For a fee of U.S. \$20.00 the government will run a search for the name of a deceased individual. There is an additional fee if records are found. Requests are usually completed within 90 days.

Immigrants to Australia

A pilot project by the State Library of New South Wales has digitized 12 microfilm reels containing records of thousands of persons arriving in Australia by ship between about 1838 and 1896.

The digital images are online at http://tinyurl.com/yeetaf3. Although they cannot be search electronically, a separate Online Index to records of Assisted Immigrants may in some cases be helpful when attempting to locate a record. The index is available at

Free Access to 1930 United States Federal Census Records

www.archive.org/details/1930_census

The Internet Archives has placed 1930 U.S. Federal Census online and made it available for free. The database is not complete but many states are already represented and others will be added soon.

There is no index so it is not possible to search the records by name. For those who know the area in which their ancestors resided, however, the records can be browsed state-by-state and enumeration district-by-enumeration district. The browsing interface is very user-friendly, allowing the researcher to move quickly through a set of records without having to download each individual census page.

Spotlight on... French-Canadian Genealogical Dictionaries

A unique aspect of genealogical research in Quebec is the availability of comprehensive genealogical dictionaries, reflecting a long tradition of scholarly genealogy pioneered by the Roman Catholic priest Cyprien Tanguay in the 19th century.

The following are key secondary tools for Quebec genealogical research:

Tanguay

Dictionnaire Genealogique des Familles Canadiennes Depuis la Fondation de la Colonie Jusqu'à Nos Jours, 7 vol.

• Tanguay compiled genealogies of French-Canadian families, publishing his first volume in 1871. This volume comprised information on families whose marriages took place in New France prior to 1700 and covered the entire alphabet from A-Z. Tanguay published an additional 6 volumes over the next 20 years. The latter 6 volumes covered the alphabet in a single sequence and included genealogies for the period from 1700-1760, with a few extending to the 19th century. The monumental work is often referred to simply as the "Tanguay."

Leboeuf

Complément au Dictionnaire Genealogique Tanguay, 2 vol. in 1

by J. Arthur Leboeuf, 1957 -Ref. FRE 929.1 T16dLc

 Although the Tanguay has been an important tool for Quebec genealogists for over 100 years, it contains many errors. This work by J. Arthur Leboeuf collects thousands of additions and corrections to Tanguay. Leboeuf compiled the information over a long period of time, publishing it in 2 series.

Jette

Dictionnaire Genealogique des Familles du Quebec, des Origines a 1730

by René Jetté, 1983 Ref. FRE 929.3714 J58d

 This massive dictionary by René Jetté was published by l'Université de Montréal in 1983 and has become one of the foremost secondary tools for Quebec research, covering the period from the beginning of New France to 1730. Jetté made many additions and corrections to the errors of Tanguay and drew on genealogical information from a variety of sources.

Google for Genealogists - 2. Advanced Search Tips

The last issue of <u>Genealogical Resources</u> <u>Newsletter</u> provided an overview of basic Google commands and operators and how they can be used in genealogical research.

Google also has an advanced form for searching. To access the form, click on the **Advanced Search** text link to the right of the search box on the Google home page (**google.ca**).

The **Advanced Search** form does not provide any functionality that is not available on the basic Google search form. It does, however, make it very easy to build a query and to harness the full potential of the search engine.

Features of the **Advanced Search** form that may be useful for genealogists include:

Need more tools?

Scroll down to find this section of the form. The **Results per page** and **Language** options are straightforward. The **File type** tool offers the capacity to restrict results to files of a certain type, for example, Adobe Acrobat PDF (.pdf), Microsoft PowerPoint (.ppt), Microsoft Word (.doc) and others.

For genealogists interested in finding information about genealogical resources available in specific types of repositories, the **Search within a site or domain** tool can be used to limit search results according to the originating organization or type of organization.

 For example, to find all pages with information about land records on B.C. government websites, the words land records could be entered at the top of the Advanced Search form (in the all these words field) and the B.C. government domain extension .gov.bc.ca in the Search within a site or domain field. Similarly, to locate information about the National Registration of 1940 on the Library and Archives Canada website, the words national registration 1940 could be entered at the top of the form and the web address for Library and Archives Canada, www.collectionscanada.gc.ca, entered in the Search within a site or domain field.

Date, usage, numeric range, and more

Look for the above link towards the bottom of the **Advanced Search** form. Click on it to reveal additional search options. Useful options include:

<u>Date</u>: limits results to pages posted within a specific time range.

<u>Usage rights</u>: limits results to pages with or without restriction based on copyright or other claims.

<u>Where your keywords show up</u>: allows the user to specify where certain keywords appear on the pages retrieved (for example, in the title of the page).

<u>Region</u>: allows the user to select from a dropdown list to limit a search to pages originating from a specific country.

<u>Numeric Range</u>: allows the user to enter dates and other numeric ranges in a search query.

For example, entering a numeric range of years limits search results to pages that refer to years within that range.
 Thus, if you entered a family name and village name (e.g. cox hanslope) at the top of the form and 1800 I 1825 in the numeric range fields, your results would include pages referring to the Cox family in the village of Hanslope within that range of dates.

Page-specific tools

Clicking on the + Date, usage, numeric range, and more link also opens an input section at the bottom of the Advanced form that offers two Page-specific tools:

<u>Find pages similar to the page</u>: allows the user to enter a web address for which Google will then retrieve results with similar characteristics.

 For example, find pages similar to the page web.victoria.ca/archives/rosssearch.asp [Ross Bay Cemetery Search]

<u>Find pages that link to the page</u>: retrieves a list of all web pages linked to a specified page. If using this tool, any information entered elsewhere on the **Advanced Search** form will be ignored.

 For example, find pages that link to the page
 www.ocl.net/genealogy/EarlyHistory
 [Oxford County Genealogy Records Database]

Finally, the **Advanced Search** page offers the opportunity to limit searches to specific Google search engines, such as **Google Books**, **Google Scholar** and **Google News archive search**.



Google Street View - See the Lands of Your Ancestors!

Google Street View was launched in the United States in May 2007 and recently expanded to cover Canada and international locations. The innovative technology provides 360° horizontal and 290° vertical panoramic street level views within Google Maps. Among many possible personal uses - from previewing vacation accommodation to showing prospective visitors where you live - Google Street View can be used to see the modern face of places inhabited by our ancestors.



Coverage is mainly limited to cities and towns, with extensive U.S. and Canadian coverage. British Isles coverage is considerable and areas of continental Europe, Asia and Australia have also been filmed. **Google** cars are continuing to film for **Street View** around the world.
