Raincoast Jews: Integration in British Columbia

Canada's population and society have developed through the addition of immigrants who bring with them their values and practices as they seek opportunities in a new land. While doing this, they have to balance a respect for their original culture while adopting and adapting to a new society. The speaker will explore the lives and contributions of five leading Jews living in British Columbia between 1860 and 1970. Those memorable for shaping communities within the province are Cecilia Davies for her charity work in early Victoria, Hannah Director who rose in a small mining camp to become head of the school board, Leon Koerner the Czechoslovakian

refugee who was associated with the lumber industry and became known for his philanthropy, Harry Adaskin who started the first UBC music school and Nathan Nemetz who rose to become the first Jewish chief justice of British Columbia. Emphasis will be placed on how their Jewish heritage shaped their professional legacy and contributions to Canadian society.

Working with their own materials, and supporting each other, learners will discover their particular motives and set goals for their research, organize and evaluate their data, and plan the first stage of their individual programs.

Lesson 1: Probe the Past – From the Known to the Unknown

Lesson 4: Right Forest, Wrong Tree: Interpret Your Findings

Build context for your research, and develop techniques for critical analysis of family history data.

Lesson 5: Pack Your Parachute: The Research Plan

Renew your research goals and prepare a plan for continuing research.

Maids in Vancouver Speaker: Ruth Derksen

In the early 1930s, young Mennonite women – mostly adolescents – began to arrive in Vancouver, seeking work as domestic servants. Most had recently come to Canada as refugees from Russia, having escaped from the terror of Stalin's regime and consequently their desperate families owed a substantial debt to the Canadian Pacific Railway for their journey.

These indomitable young single women, however, were pioneers of their community for they broke through the barriers of the "evil city," the English language and the upper-class British culture. Significantly, they shaped the settlement patterns of not only Vancouver, but also western Canada. The author and speaker, Ruth Derksen, pays tribute to their impact and their long lasting legacy.



England's Immigrants 1330-1550: Resident Aliens in the Late Middle Ages

The Universities of York and Sheffield, together with the National Archives, have teamed up to provide a searchable database of over 64,000 immigrants who arrived in England from the 14th through to the 16th centuries. Records were collected from a variety of sources and the database allows researchers to search by name, place of origin, place of residence and occupation.

Ireland, Poverty Relief Loans, 1821-1874

The Irish Reproductive Loan Fund, set up in 1824 to provide small loans to those affected by poverty and famine, has been digitized for the first time by **FindMyPast**. These records from the National Archives which deal with the working poor and their loan applications provide information such as the name of the borrower and two names of guarantors, occupation, family circumstances, and whether the borrower emigrated.

1939 National Enumeration Register

In a joint project the National Archives in partnership with **FindMyPast** are making available online the records of over 30 million people living in England and Wales who were captured in the 1939 National Enumeration Register. The register used to issue identity cards and ration books was taken on 29 September 1939 and noted each individual's name, address, date of birth, sex, marital status, occupation and any changes of name.

For reasons of privacy, information on living individuals will be kept closed for 100 years from their year of birth or until proof of death has been authenticated.

In the absence of a 1931 census and a 1941 census, this fully searchable collection will be a great resource for family history research.

Early Irish Birth Index

"The Society has launched another new and innovative database to add to those already found on its website – announced yesterday at Roots Tech 2015 in Salt Lake City, Utah. The Early Irish Birth Index aims to bring to the attention of Irish genealogists the myriad of alternative sources noting birth information in Ireland.

The Early Irish Birth Index holds just over 5,000 records of alternatives sources for births in Ireland, ranging from early Irish census records, Registry of Deeds' memorials, newspapers, gravestone inscriptions, diaries and letters. The number of names in the contained exceeds 10,400.

This new index is the second database to be launched by the Irish Genealogical Research Society in the last two years. The Early Irish Marriage Index, which has produced an evergrowing index to alternative sources for marriage records in Ireland, was created in 2012 and already now holds more than 66,000 records, noting the names of well over 147,000 brides, grooms and relatives."

The Irish Genealogist (TIG) has been published annually since 1937 and comprises thousands of articles related to Irish genealogy, noting details on family histories, pedigrees, leases, memorial inscriptions, deeds, newspaper extracts and transcripts of parish registers, voters lists, census substitutes, wills, letters, family bibles, rentals and militia & army rolls. The list is endless!

A free online Names Index to TIG, comprising in excess of a quarter of a million names, has been available on the Society's website since autumn 2013. Now, following an intensive project to scan images of the journal's articles, the database will link researchers directly to articles that match their search criteria. Initially, the Society is launching images of volume 10 of TIG (covering the years 1998-2001) and these will be followed with regular releases right up to volume 13 (up to 2013)."
